

Listen to a conversation between a bunch of motorcycle riders, and the phrases you'll hear repeated most often are "what?" and "would you repeat that?" Along with other things we've done in our lives, riding a motorcycle can put a lot of strain on our hearing. Usually it's not the sound of the bike that does the damage, but the sound of the wind passing our ears for thousands and thousands of miles year after year. A 'full' helmet doesn't guarantee hearing protection, and some helmets increase the noise in our ears. A good set of earplugs is a great way to protect our hearing.

Everyone loses some hearing over the years depending on genetics, our trade, or the sports we've been involved in during our lives. Folks who listen to music with headphones and the volume cranked up can expect trouble down the road; people who exercise at the gym with earphones on and the volume high can do excessive damage; and anyone who spent a lot of time at rock concerts or clubs will probably spend a lot of their later years not being fully included in many conversations. If we add motorcycle riding to any of those, the earlier we start to protect our hearing, the better.

Some people (like this writer) don't give the subject much thought (what, me worry?) until they start hearing tones or sounds like there's water running in the next room 24 hours a day, or find themselves saying "what ?" an awful lot. You can pump iron to get your muscles back in tone, or even do exercises that will improve your eyesight, but like diamonds are... hearing loss is Forever.

You can find good washable, reusable earplugs, custom fitted plugs, or good disposables. If you use a computer, try (www.webbikeworld.com/Earplugs/earplugs.htm). You can also try safety supply houses, motorcycle shops (I don't think they make earplugs in chrome, yet) or at sporting goods stores. If you are not a user yet, try out a pair; follow directions putting them in, and take them out slowly and carefully to avoid damage to the eardrum. Keeping the right and left plugs separate is considered to be a safe thing to do to prevent the transfer of ear infection.

They are a little weird when you first start using them... your engine sounds different, and you'll be concerned that you may not hear that car moving into the lane next to you. But after all, we should probably save whatever we can, or get used to writing notes to each other somewhere in years to come. Be Alert, Ride Safe, and Hear! Hear!

Christmas is upon us again so quickly this year and the riding season for the summer is behind us. This is the time of the year that we all look to the good things we have in our lives. Along with that we reflect on our losses from this past year of good friends and partners on this road of life we follow.

The case in point here is especially important to those of us who live here in Oregon. Just in October we lost a warrior in our fight for unity and freedom in the motorcycle world; Longview Tom, the Oregon chairman of the Confederations Of Clubs, due to an accident on his way to the regional NCOM conference in Spokane, Washington. In addition to that, on Halloween day, another of our brothers, Rotten Roger, was nearly run over by a cager who suddenly decided to make a U-turn directly in front of him. That resulted in him residing at the Oregon Health Sciences Hospital in Portland with a broken pelvis and his scooter turned to toast.

I guess Im concerned about the hazards we face on the roadways all over the country. Especially at this time of the year with falling leaves and wet roads on top of the holiday traffic getting heavier by the day. Add the cell phone text messagers and those just not paying attention to what is going on around them, and we have serious problems on the highway.

We have to be more vigilant than ever before. If we never gave thought to taking defensive rider training, now is the time to at least consider checking into it. It might just save your life or the passenger on the back of your scoot. But do whatever you gotta do to stay that much more alert out there. We want to enjoy each other for a whole lot more Christmases! And from your Gunny, a Merry Christmas and happy, safe holidays.

NCOM New Bytes

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico: Solidarity Works!! The day after the Governor signed the new restrictive law on motorcyclists and riders of all other two-wheeled powered vehicles, the law was suspended because of protests by riders. The legislature backed off, and said they needed more time to study the law. Among other things it required long pants, boots and gloves as well as helmets. It also made the legal blood-alcohol limit for riders 0.02 % as opposed to 0.08 % for all other vehicle operators.

Riders rightly felt this was discriminatory. I dont blame them for protesting. I would too. In addition to all those restrictions, the law required all riders to wear reflective vests after dark. I wonder whats wrong with using lights on rigs at night. They make some bright ones.

AIRBAG JACKETS: A company by the name of Impact Jackets has been selling motorcycle jackets with airbags for a few years, for \$500. One Baltimore man would rebut any high-cost argument, since the jacket apparently saved him from plenty of pain after he was thrown 100 feet off his bike. Amazingly, the guy walked away from the crash with sore ribs and a broken thumb. Paramedics at the scene were surprised he wasn't worse off. Still, before I put one on, I'd like to see some further research.

IOWA: DEATH by DEER: The number of deadly crashes between bikers and deer is on the rise. Officials say ten people have been killed so far this year in Iowa alone. Eight were motorcyclists who died in crashes with Bambi. Two others died when their bikes hit a deer and then collided with another vehicle.


Bikers everywhere need to be extra careful this time of year. More deer are on the move because of the breeding season and the fall harvest. I dont know of any state in the Lower 48 that does not have a deer population.

NEW ZEALAND: Just hours after a tour guide warned a group of overseas motorcyclists to stay on the left hand side of the road, an American biker strayed to the right, colliding head-on with another motorcyclist. The fire caused by the crash



put both riders in the hospital with burns and other injuries. The rider was from California, and was ordered to pay \$5,000 to the other rider for emotional harm, and was disqualified from driving for six months. The injuries were severe to both men. The men were friends and plan to ride again; this time on the correct side of the road.

Thank God both were well insured. Don't forget that your AIM Attorneys will give you a free INSURANCE REVIEW, to let you know what sort of insurance is best for you — and they aren't selling it, either. They just know what happens to us when we go down, and what coverages are most important to carry, and which ones to buy more of.

GUNNY AGAIN: If you find yourself in a mess, dont mess around and try and do things yourself, thinking you'll save some money. AIM attorneys will talk to you free. Fees are on a contingency, based on how much is recovered. Money is sorted out at the end. Do what your attorney tells you to do and you will come out much better because they do this stuff all the time. You are a PART-timer. Makes sense, HUH? Your local AIM attorney is as close as your phone, toll-free 24/7 at 800-ON-A-BIKE.

Keep the round side on the bottom.

BIKER HAS DIFFICULTY GETTING LICENSE REINSTATED: Howard Burley loves his Harley-Davidson. That's exactly why the Arizona biker hasn't owned a car in more than a decade. "You love the feel — the vibrations and stuff like that," he told 3TV reporter Gary Harper of 3 On Your Side.

But last year, Burley was arrested for drunk driving. It was a huge mistake, but he said he learned from it, and even claims the DUI has made him a better man these days. "Absolutely. I quit drinking. I go through alcohol classes. It was definitely a wake up call," he said.

Burley served jail time, paid all of his court costs and fines and said he's cleaned up his life. The only thing he wants now is for his driver's license to be reinstated by Motor Vehicle Division.

To do that, MVD said all he has to do is install an ignition interlock device. Drivers have to blow into it at random times to make sure they're not drinking while they're driving. If the driver has been drinking, the device prevents the car from starting up.

"The only problem is they do not put them on motorcycles," Burley said. And a motorcycle is all that Burley owns. If he wants to get his license back, he said MVD told him he'll have to buy a car.

Organizations like the Arizona Confederation of Motorcycle Clubs say Burley's situation is a good example of motorcycle discrimination. "It's another way the government is forcing you into something you don't want to do," said Steven Musgrave with the Arizona Confederation of Motorcycle Clubs.

Although some states do allow motorcycles to have the device, Arizona does not. For now, the state said it's not planning on using the device on motorcycles.

Burley said he and numerous motorcycle organizations that lobby lawmakers are monitoring the situation to see if changes might be made in the future. In the meantime, he's resorted to taking the bus and can only hope the MVD will change its mind.

CONGRESS FORMS MOTORCYCLE CAUCUS: The U.S. House of Representatives has formed a motorcycle safety caucus, and riders are urged to contact their motorcycle-friendly Reps and ask them to join. A caucus is a group within a legislative body that is assembled to represent a specific interest or influence a particular area of policy. The motorcycle caucus will focus on ways that Congress can improve and advance motorcycle safety efforts.

To become part of this first-ever motorcycle safety caucus, interested House members should contact either caucus cochairs, Gabrielle Giffords (D-AZ) or Michael Burgess (R-TX). *Continued on page 18*

Giffords, a freshman member of Congress and an avid motorcycle rider herself, said "We know from national studies that in almost two-thirds of fatal car/motorcycle crashes, the fault was with the driver of the car. We can do more to address this critical problem, and public education is a key to bringing about awareness and a reduction in such accidents."

Burgess is a long time supporter of motorcycling who said he is looking forward to working with motorcyclists across the country on motorcycle safety, education and awareness issues.

MORE AMERICANS BUCKLE UP AND WEAR HELMETS: A new focus on motorcycle safety and increased efforts to encourage seatbelt use are paying off, according to U.S. Transportation Secretary Mary E. Peters, who said new figures released recently show the national seat belt use rate increased to an all time high and more motorcyclists are wearing their helmets.

According to the annual National Occupant Protection Use Survey (NOPUS), an additional three million more Americans wore seat belts last year as seat belt use rose to 82.4%, an increase of 1.2 percentage points. Additionally, the survey showed that motorcycle helmet use increased 7 percentage points to 58%.

NHTSA Administrator Nicole R. Nason told a national highway safety conference in Portland, Oregon, that the new data show the greatest rise in motorcycle helmet use occurred in the South, which rose by 13 percentage points to 58%. Helmet use rose by 11 percentage points in the Northeast to 58% and by 5 percentage points in the West to 77%. However, helmet use fell by 1 percentage point in the Midwest to 49%.

"Motorcycle safety is a priority at the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and we are looking at all options to reduce motorcycle fatalities," said Nason.

MOTORCYCLES TO REMAIN LESS THAN 100 HP IN FRANCE: Bad news for French motorcycle riders. The almighty and powerful European Commission has ruled that France is in its legal rights to limit motorcycle power to 100 horsepower.

The French Association of Angry Bikers (FFMC — Federation Francaise des Motards en Colere) sued the French state and took them to the European courts. Apparently, having uniform laws in Europe only apply to anything except motorcycles, said the FFMC about the ruling. The EC stated that each country could impose their own restrictions.

The FFMC countered that an extensive study by Dutch TNO showed no correlation between accidents and motorcycles with more power than 100 H.P.

So riding in France on a French-registered motorcycle means you can only have 100 H.P., while anyone else riding in France can ride whatever they want, on the same road, with the same traffic, and cars are not included in the restriction.

The FFMC vows that they are not going to let this gostay tuned!

WEIRD NEWS: PORK OR HOG, THIEVES CHOOSE THE OTHER WHITE MEAT: Thieves in China are stealing pork because the staple meat has become so expensive. A Shenzhen newspaper reported that a pork seller was knocked off his motorcycle by robbers who stole his load of over 200 pounds of pork, but left his motorcycle in the road.

He was on his way to a market in Shenzhen, just over the border from Hong Kong, when four men jumped from a minibus and threatened him with knives.

The pork was worth 2000 yuan more than the motorcycle.

Alexander Kuzmin, the 33-year-old Russian mayor of Megion in Siberia, has banned 25 phrases such as this as a way to make his administration more efficient, and bureaucrats who say I can t, or It s not my job can look for another job.

Thank a soldier.


