

TIPS FOR EARTHQUAKE SAFETY

EXTRACT FROM DOUG COPP'S ARTICLE ON THE: "TRIANGLE OF LIFE" My name is Doug Copp. I am the Rescue Chief and Disaster Manager of the American Rescue Team International (ARTI), the world's most experienced rescue team. The information in this article will save lives in an earthquake.

I have crawled inside 875 collapsed buildings, worked with rescue teams from 60 countries, founded rescue teams in several countries, and I am a member of many rescue teams from many countries... I was the United Nations expert in Disaster Mitigation for two years. I have worked at every major disaster in the world since 1985, except for simultaneous disasters. The first building I ever crawled inside of was a school in Mexico City during the 1985 earthquake. Every child was under its desk. Every child was crushed to the thickness of their bones. They could have survived by lying down next to their desks in the aisles. It was obscene, unnecessary and I wondered why the children were not in the aisles. I didn't at the time know that the children were told to hide under something. Simply stated, when buildings collapse, the weight of the ceilings falling upon the objects or furniture inside crushes these objects, leaving a space or void next to them. This space is what I call the "triangle of life". The larger the object, the stronger, the less it will compact. The less the object compacts, the larger the void, the greater the probability that the person who is using this void for safety will not be injured. The next time you watch collapsed buildings, on television, count the "triangles" you see formed. They are everywhere. It is the most common shape, you will see, in a collapsed building.

Forget everything you've been trained to do during an earthquake!!!

Boy! Is this ever an eye opener. Directly opposite of what we've been taught over the years! I can remember in school being told to, "duck and cover" or stand in a doorway during an earthquake. This guy's findings are absolutely amazing. I hope we all remember his survival method if we are ever in an earthquake!

TIPS FOR EARTHQUAKE SAFETY

- 1) Most everyone who simply "ducks and covers" WHEN BUILDINGS COLLAPSE are crushed to death. People who get under objects, like desks or cars, are crushed.
- 2) Cats, dogs and babies often naturally curl up in the fetal position. You should too in an earthquake... It is a natural safety/survival instinct. You can survive in a smaller void. Get next to an object, next to a sofa, next to a large bulky object that will compress slightly but leave a void next to it.
- Wooden buildings are the safest type of construction to be in during an earthquake. Wood is flexible and moves with the force of the earthquake. If the wooden building does collapse, large survival voids are created. Also, the wooden building has less concentrated, crushing weight. Brick buildings will break into individual bricks. Bricks will cause many injuries but less squashed bodies than concrete slabs.
- 4) If you are in bed during the night and an earthquake occurs, simply roll off the bed. A safe void will exist around the bed. Hotels can achieve a much greater survival rate in earthquakes, simply by posting a sign on the back of the door of every room telling occupants to lie down on the floor, next to the bottom of the bed during an earthquake.
- If an earthquake happens and you cannot easily escape by getting out the door or window, then lie down and curl up in the fetal position next to a sofa, or large chair.
- Most everyone who gets under a doorway when buildings collapse is killed. How? If you stand under a doorway and the doorjamb falls forward or backward you will be crushed by the ceiling above. If the door jam falls sideways you will be cut in half by the doorway. In either case, you will be killed!
- Never go to the stairs. The stairs have a different "moment of frequency" (they swing separately from the main part of the building). The stairs and remainder of the building continuously bump into each other until structural failure of the stairs takes place. The people who get on stairs before they fail are chopped up by the stair treads horribly mutilated. Even if the building doesn't collapse, stay away from the stairs. The stairs are a likely part of the building to be damaged. Even if the stairs are not collapsed by the earthquake, they may collapse later when overloaded by fleeing people. They should always be checked for safety, even when the rest of the building is not damaged.

- 8) Get Near the Outer Walls Of Buildings Or Outside Of Them If Possible It is much better to be near the outside of the building rather than the interior. The farther inside you are from the outside perimeter of the building the greater the probability that your escape route will be blocked.
- People inside of their vehicles are crushed when the road above falls in an earthquake and crushes their vehicles; which is exactly what happened with the slabs between the decks of the Nimitz Freeway... the victims of the San Francisco earthquake all stayed inside of their vehicles. They were all killed. They could have easily survived by getting out and sitting or lying next to their vehicles. Everyone killed would have survived if they had been able to get out of their cars and sit or lie next to them. All the crushed cars had voids 3 feet high next to them, except for the cars that had columns fall directly across them.
- I discovered, while crawling inside of collapsed newspaper offices and other offices with a lot of paper, that paper does not compact. Large voids are found surrounding stacks of paper. Spread the word and save someone's life... The entire world is experiencing natural calamities so be prepared! "We are but angels with one wing, it takes two to fly". In 1996 we made a film, which proved my survival methodology to be correct. The Turkish Federal Government, City of Istanbul, University of Istanbul Case Productions and ARTI cooperated to film this practical, scientific test. We collapsed a school and a home with 20 mannequins inside. Ten mannequins did "duck and cover," and ten mannequins I used in my triangle of life" survival method. After the simulated earthquake collapse we crawled through the rubble and entered the building to film and document the results. The film, in which I practiced my survival techniques under directly observable, scientific conditions, relevant to building collapse, showed there would have been zero percent survival for those doing duck and cover. There would likely have been 100 percent survivability for people using my method of the "triangle of life." This film has been seen by millions of viewers on television in Turkey and the rest of Europe, and it was seen in the USA, Canada and Latin America on the TV program "Real TV."



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PARK 'N RIDE RALLY

The BMW Club of Southern California is one of the founding members of the SCMA but in recent years none of our relationship has languished. At the Clubs January Board of Directors (BOD) meeting the decision was made to reinvigorate

our long standing association with the SCMA and to reinstate a club Travelers Award ride. Many of you may remember the long standing Gumball Rally that the Club ran each year. But over time that rally became a little stale and interest waned to the point where setting up and running the ride simply it wasn't worth the effort. This year we've come up with a new format that we think will be fun, represent a bit of a challenge to our riders and give local SCMA club members a chance to get a taste of and endurance ride but without the endurance part. The BMW Club of Southern California is presents The Park 'n Ride Rally. The real rally is scheduled for October 2nd and as a practice run we are scheduling a mini-rally for May 16th.

Since many of people aren't clear on what this all means here are some answers to frequently asked questions that we hope will help.

- Q. So what is this rally and what do you mean "like an endurance rally but without the endurance part"?
- A. Many people are familiar with the Iron Butt Rally. The IBR is a very long distance rally where the goal is not to rack up lots of miles but acquire the highest number of "bonus points". You get bonus points by going to places selected by the Rally Master and listed in a "rally pack" (these bonus locations are typically identified by street address or gps location). Besides the bonus locations the rally pack will explain what you need to do when you get there (i.e. take a picture; find the answer to a question, etc). The challenge with the Iron Butt is that the bonus locations are often on opposite sides of the country. What we've done is adapt the "acquire bonus points" goals into an easy to complete day ride. It is important to understand that this is not a speed contest nor a race, but rather a test of how good you are at planning a route, navigating efficiently and following your plan.

In our rally all of these bonus locations are local to Southern California. Your goal should be to try to get to as many of these locations as possible within the time allotted, in this case six hours. At each bonus location you will be required to take a picture of the site, answer a question or take some other simple action that is clearly explained in the rally pack. So the challenge will be to go through the list of bonus locations figuring distance, time and the number of points—which are different for each location. For example, we might have a bonus location at the Palomar Observatory worth 499 points. However, the Observatory is a long way out of the way and up a very curvy road which would take a long time to reach. The challenge is to balance the time and trouble getting to, and from, the bonus location against the number of points awarded.

It sounds like fun, but I've never done a rally. How can I hope to compete?

- A. In the October rally we will have two classes: a Novice class and an Open class. If you are new to this type of rally, or don't want to ride to many locations, you should register for the Novice class and you will only have to compete against yourself. The mini-rally on May 16th will only have a Novice class.
- Q. What's the difference between the Novice and Open classes?
- A. The Novice class will have a route that is a little simpler and shorter. Novice rally riders only have to ride a minimum of 100 miles and get three (3) bonus locations to be considered a finisher and qualify for the SCMA Travelers Award, (October ride only).

The Open class is more for riders who have some experience in this type of rally. The number and complexity of bonus locations will be greater and anyone hoping to be competitive in the Open class will probably have to cover well over 200 miles in the 6 hours allowed. Riders in the Open class will receive 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes, while Novice class riders will receive certificates of com-



pletion. To be deemed a finisher in the Open class a rider will have to log at least 150 miles and 5 bonus locations. Of course, finishers in the Open class also qualify for the Travelers Award. Again, the mini-rally will only have a Novice class and is not a Travelers Award event, as this is a practice run for the October rally.

- Q. OK, so what am I supposed to do as a Novice rally rider?
- A. You and your riding partners should plan a route that works for your group with the goal being to ride that route efficiently. Measure how well you do by how close you can stick to your plan. Plan too conservatively and you miss out on bonus points. Be too ambitious and you'll have to skip stops and adjust on the fly towards the end of the day. As a Novice if you come in on time getting all the points you tried for, you have succeeded! In October Novices who complete at least 100 miles and visit 3 bonus locations will be awarded Certificates of Completion and qualify for the Travelers Award.
- Q. What about lunch, fuel and rest stops?
- A. Because everyone's route will vary based on their own strategy, no specific time or location is set. As the rally participant part of your planning is to allow enough time to eat, go to the bathroom, get fuel, get off your bike to take the necessary photos, or whatever you need to do other than ride.
- Q. Can I ride as part of a team?
- A. The short answer is yes. Riders may work as a team with their pillion (passenger). In the Novice class and mini-rally you may ride with others leaving and joining the group as you like. However, in October Open class riders who leave as a team will have to complete the entire rally as a team.
- Q. Do I need a GPS?

A gps can be a great tool but riders who don't have one can do fine with a paper map. Since you'll have a week to review the rally pack and lay out your route you can always use something like Google Maps to print out map and route information and just do it the old fashioned way.

Q. So how do we sign up?

You will be getting an email about the mini-rally shortly. Register for it, and you will get your rally pack one week in advance. Chris & Robert will be available to answer questions by email prior to the ride.

For more information on both the full rally in October and the mini-rally in May go to the club website at www.bmwcosc.com/parknride.html or to our home page and click on the Park 'N Ride icon. A more complete list of FAQ's and examples of some rally instructions are available for review. There is no fee for the May mini-rally although we ask that riders take a brief survey at the end of the rally to help us deal with any problems or concerns for the October ride. So if you are willing to be a "beta tester" for our rally let us know by emailing to, rallymaster@bmwcosc.com and we hope to see you in May and October.


The Shamrock Road Riders invite all of you to join us on a two day tour around the Antelope Valley and off to the coast. 
