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

This year we're adding a road located in New Hampshire, "Kancamagus Highway" with a side trip up the "Mt Washington Auto Road". We dropped the route in Vermont VT-100 since many of our 2012 riders had complained about the condition of the roadway. So, we still have a terrific and scenic New England route in our 2013 collection!

The other 14 roads remain unchanged for 2013. We are still including Beartooth Pass and Chief Joseph Highways; CA-1, Monterey to Morro Bay; Lolo Pass; Cherohala Skyway and Tail of the Dragon; Going to the Sun Road, MT; "Million Dollar Highway", CO; Blue Ridge Parkway; WA-20, Concrete to Omak,

MT; VA-16, "Back of the Dragon"; The Twisted Sisters, TX; US-16 Custer to Mt Rushmore; US-191 Springerville to Three Way, AZ; UT-12 Torrey to Bryce Canyon and; US-50, the Loneliest road in America, Ely to Carson City, NV. 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Riding The Best 15: Blue Ridge and Back of the Dragon By Gonzo Gonzales

On the morning of August 12 I rolled out of brother's in Lusby, Maryland heading south into Virginia toward Waynesboro where I would connect to the Blue Ridge Parkway (BRP).

Riding the parkway was beautiful. Overwhelming vistas from lookout points seemed to be located at every other mile. Lush greenery was alongside the well-maintained road. It is a narrow 2 lane road and with long no passing zones and a speed limit of 45, it means real slow going. I entered the BRP around 4:30 PM so after about an hour of riding and stopping for photos I realized there was no way

I could make it to Fancy Gap before nightfall.

Bailing off the BRP at Buena Vista was easy and I found the Buena Vista Motel. The place

was old style and clean and a reasonable price. The owner gave me a discount, marked restaurant locations on the town map he provided for me, and I headed into the night towards downtown. I found the family-owned Canton Chinese restaurant still open. I was welcomed with hot tea and enjoyed the spicy kung pao chicken. It was equal to the California restaurants back home and authentic Chinese.

After a good night's rest I went to TheBlue Dog Art Café for breakfast. I met Fred Pasternak a local retiree, and Butch Hogan whose wife Sue owns the restaurant. Butch engaged me in conversation while also admiring Sophia and the oversized carriage rack that I have on the back for my gear. He noticed my USMC(Ret) plate and told me his stepson is an active duty Marine with several Afghanistan tours under his belt.

It was pretty easy to get back on the Blue Ridge exactly where I got off and I headed towards Roanoke. The ride was pure joy. Easy speeds, no traffic, lush greenery, beautiful views, fresh air. I enjoyed deep breaths of clean air....no exhaust fumes up here! I was so enthralled with this ride and frequently stopped at lookouts to click a photo and look at the valleys below dotted with farms. small towns, thin line roads barely discernible from this distance as they meandered through the rolling hills of the valley. Before I knew it the road weaved its way around Roanoke. When I arrived at Peaks of Otter I found a lodge/restaurant so I decided to go in and treat myself to a nice lunch. It was good to take a break and just enjoy the rest. My waitress was Keegan and she filled my empty coke bottles with water for the next leg of the ride.

Back on the road heading for Fancy Gap, it didn't take me long to realize that I was not going to make it to The Dragon Inn north of Chilowee and The Back of the Dragon (VA 16) if I continued on to Fancy Gap. So, I kicked in a new plan and decided to go to the 150 mile marker as required by the SCMA for this event then bail out from there to get on the I-81 down to Marion to ride northwest on VA 16 "Back of the Dragon".

I found the 150 marker and took pics. Then about 10-15 miles later found a paved road that took me off the BRP, down thru Gap countryside and farms, and into Floyd where I tanked up again. Garmin got me onto the US8 which finally got me south onto I-81.

As I pulled off for Marion, VA and rolled into a station for gas, and a receipt for proof of visit, the thunder gods moved in and drenched the area keeping me under the gas station canopy for about 45 minutes. When I left there it was close to 7:30pm and I didn't go more than a mile when I came upon the Marion Town sign and had to stop for a photo proof....as I came to a stop two deer bolted out from behind the sign where they were feeding and ran up the hill.

Riding the Blue Ridge and Back of the Dragon (continued)

Not too far from the Town Sign, the climb started for the Back of the Dragon and the first 180 deg ascending switchback was experienced.

The road was a combination of good curves but not too many switchbacks. It was bordered with forested mountain on one side and woods or cliffs on the other side. Since the sun was relatively low on the horizon there were mostly shadows; and in some places the trees made a canopy over the road. It was a good medium climb up the first mountain and a matching descent into the valley on the other side. A bit of level road and then I climbed again, over the ridge, down into a valley and then up and over a third ridge. After coming off the last ridge the steepness shallowed out and the road had two or three left curves before coming to a right curve through trees whose bark was completely covered in vines of some sort. It seemed like a jungle.

Light was waning and my Garmin had me arriving in Tazewell at a spot where VA 16 took a sharp right at a stop sign and then another 3-5 miles to Tazewell. it was almost dark and I took a left onto the business 16. This took me through a community and I was expecting to enter a downtown area but instead rode by what appeared to be a fairgrounds where I could see the top of a Ferris Wheel over the low buildings. Right after that there was nothing so I turned around and headed to where I entered the town, turned left, and found a gas station to get my receipt. Now it was totally dark and no photo ops.

However, earlier on the highway, in one of the valleys, there was a sign showing US16 and Tazewell at 19 miles. There was still plenty of light so I stopped for a photo op and on the 2nd photo using the timer I was walking back to retrieve the camera when dogs started barking. They ran down a farm's dirt driveway and came to the road's edge growling and barking at me. This was a clear sign for me to get outa Dodge. One dog hid in the bushes and glared at me...the other came about 3 feet into the road and watched me. I knew what they were waiting for....they wanted to chase the bike as I rode away. I started the bike and just as I started rolling the both charged fast! HA!...I was ready for

them and poured on the gas leaving them in the 'dust'.....so much fun.

After tanking up I put Maryville in the Garmin and was directed back



out to the fairgrounds and to highway US19 which I think was named 'Lonesome Pine". Making a left I felt totally disoriented in the dark and was very unsure of the direction as I was expecting to make a right towards I-77 for a southerly run back to I-81. I stopped at some large business parking lot under their lamp and consulted my AAA map and figured out what Garmin was doing....it was taking me on a route paralleling I-81...a more direct route of shorter distance.

At Cedar Bluff, just outside of Richmond I got rained on...never saw it coming because of the dark...so I pulled into a McDonalds and had a small bite to eat. It was already 10pm and my Droid Maps told me I was 200 miles from Maryville...a good 3 hours from The Dragon Inn where I had a room waiting for me. So I called it quits and got a room at the Timberline Lodge, a local motel on Claypool Hill (at the intersection of US19 and I think 460). The motel was clean and comfortable but my windows and doorway faced the highway below and I could hear the semi's engine braking all night long.

Ride Safe: Lane Splitting Tips* *Excerpted From the California Motorcyclist Safety Program

Lane splitting in a safe and prudent manner is not illegal in the state of California. Motorcyclists who are competent enough riders to lane split, should follow these general guidelines if choosing to lane split:

1) Travel no more than 10 MPH faster than other traffic because danger increases at higher speed differentials.

A speed differential of 10 miles per hour or less allows an alert, competent rider enough time to identify and react to most dangerous situations that can occur. The greater the speed differential, the less time a rider has to identify and react to a hazard.

2) It is not advisable to lane split when traffic flow is at 30 mph or faster --- danger increases with speed.

At 20 mph, it takes 30 to 60 feet to identify a hazard and begin to take evasive action. Actual braking or swerving takes additional time and distance. Braking and stopping distance varies greatly based on a multitude of factors (rider, bike and environment). As speed increases, crash severity increases.

3) Usually it is safer to split between the #1 and #2 lanes than between other lanes.

Other road users are more accustomed to motorcycles splitting between the #1 and #2 (furthest left) lanes. Avoid splitting in lanes near freeway on-ramps and exits. Avoid splitting lanes when another motorcycle rider is splitting between other nearby lanes as cars may make additional room for one rider and accidentally reduce space for another.

4) Consider the total environment in which you are splitting, including the width of the lanes, size of surrounding vehicles, as well as roadway, weather, and lighting conditions.

Some lanes are narrower than others, leaving little room to pass safely. If you can't fit, don't split. Some vehicles are wider than others, it is not advisable to split near wide trucks. If you can't fit, don't split. Know the limitations of your motorcycle. Wide bars, fairing and bags require more space between vehicles. If you can't fit, don't split. Avoid splitting on unfamiliar roads to avoid surprises such

as poor road surfaces. Seams in the pavement or concrete between lanes can be hazardous if they are wide or uneven. Poor visibility, due to darkness or weather conditions, makes it difficult for riders to see road hazards and makes it more difficult for drivers to see you. Help drivers see you by wearing brightly colored protective gear and using high beams during daylight.

5) Be alert and anticipate possible movements by other road users.

Be very aware of what the cars around you are doing. If a space, or gap, opens up next to your lane, be prepared to react accordingly. Always be prepared to take evasive action if a vehicle changes lanes. Account for inattentive or distracted drivers. Riders should not weave back and forth between lanes or ride on top of the line. Riders should avoid lingering in blind spots. Never ride while impaired by drugs, alcohol or fatigue. Constantly scan for changing conditions.

Remember:

These guidelines are not guaranteed to keep you safe. Lane splitting should not be performed by inexperienced riders. These guidelines assume a high level of riding competency and experience.

Every rider has ultimate responsibility for his or her own decision making and safety. Riders must be conscious of reducing crash risk at all times. California law requires all motorcycle riders and passengers wear a helmet that complies with the DOT FMVSS 218 standard.

You can get a ticket! Motorcyclists who lane split are not relieved of the responsibility to obey all existing traffic laws and ride sanely. With respect to possible law enforcement action, keep in mind that it will be up to the discretion of the Law Enforcement Officer to determine whether your riding behavior is safe and prudent.


