and besides people probably don't know what to get you anyways!



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This year's October Grand Tour began on October 4th with riders checking in at 7am at Denny's Restaurant on Delone Street in Canyon Country. The twelve riders enjoyed breakfast and then departed on their individual rides, heading for Scotts Valley, east of Santa Cruz.

The route took riders along CA126 into Ventura (home to Mission San Buena Ventura) and onto US101 north. The weather was perfect Southern California weather and perfect for a 350-mile ride along the beautiful Pacific coast. Continuing through Santa Barbara, riders turned onto CA1 south of Buellton and headed toward Lompoc and Vandenberg AFB (one could ride by the Mission La Purisima Concepcion just outside of Lompoc and avoid passing through the center of town).

From there CA-1 ventured into San Luis

Obispo and then split off US101, angling northwest toward Morro Bay. Riders had a beautiful



view of the famous Morro Rock.

Departing Morro Bay, all were

anticipating the beautiful vistas of the Pacific Coast ride, one of the 15 Best USA Roads Challenge. Just north of Cambria riders passed through San Simeon with its view of famous Hearst Castle high in the hills, and about four miles later, riders could observe the Elephant Seals sunbathing on the beach.


At Ragged Point some took a lunch break enjoying excellent sandwiches at the local restaurant while others continued another 15 miles or less to Gorda and enjoyed lunch there while viewing the Pacific Ocean. Fuel at both Ragged Pt and Gorda was in the \$5 range. Another 12-15 miles up the coast

riders passed the obscure entry onto the challenging Nacimiento-Fergusson Rd. This is the only road



between Morro Bay and Carmel that cuts over the mountains, connecting to US101 at King City via Hunter-Liggett Army Base. If you take this road be prepared for challenging climbs, descents, turns, and very tight spots. It's not a road for beginners. If you do take it, you'll find yourself at the Hunter-Liggett Army Base and the Mission San Antonio de Padua. The Mission has the first recorded marriage in Alta California taking place here in 1773.

During a ride planning session, Steve Howe (Ride Chair), Lori Anttila (Secretary) and Steve Ogden (Ride Co-chair) were sitting back in their chairs pondering dark thoughts. They were challenged to find cemeteries for the Cemetery Tour that hadn't been visited before and taking routes that went to new and interesting places.

That's when Lori came up with the idea of heading north.....as in REALLY NORTH! She

proposed this year's start point to be in Bakersfield and end in Bishop.



There were a number of desert roads and cemeteries that could be found between those two points that many of our riders hadn't experienced before. It was an excellent idea! Steve Ogden and Lori also found the perfect starting point at Zingo's Café located on Buck Owen's Blvd just off CA99.

The "Cemetery Trio" (Steve, Steve and Lori) conducted the sign-ins and issued ride pins



while Alan and Pat Veth contributed to the fun with an occasional witticism while enjoying their breakfast. Riders signed in

using the backbone and leg bone shaped pens provided by Lori and "gifted" to riders to take



home as a souvenir. We had 17 riders on 15 bikes show up for the event and everyone agreed that Zingo's Ham, eggs, potatoes and pancakes were the biggest servings they had ever seen!! We got a group shot of the last riders before they headed out on their ride into the past! Unfortunately forensics was unable to identify the bodies in the photo.

The route took riders out of Bakersfield heading east on CA178 into the delightful

curves of Kern Canyon road thru Lake Isabella, back



onto 178 towards the small town of Onyx and Cottage Grove Cemetery just a little bit more east. They continued onto CA14

north to US395.

Exiting on 190 riders then headed northwest on CA136 to find the Keeler Cemetery. Once riders found the site their only option was to park their bikes on the shoulder and hike across the

desert sand to see the markers.

From there it was about 16 miles to Lone Pine to find the Pioneer Cemetery and the Old Lone Pine Cemetery where, if the rumors were correct, two riders dropped their bikes in the soft dirt road. Before departing Lone Pine some folks made a pit stop and then headed north eleven miles for Manzanar NHS. Manzanar is on the SCMA's Parks Adventure Tour and has one of the best informative Visitor's Center telling the story of how the Federal Government incarcerated and relocated American citizens of Japanese descent to this barren, cold desert location. Visiting the cemetery was a challenge however, as riders had to traverse the soft dirt



road. So most opted out and just visited the Center.

Next stop was about 7 miles north into the town of Independence to visit the Independence Jewish Cemetery. By the way, for

those of you who enjoy camping while motorcycling, Independence has a nice public campground about ½ mile from the city center. It is well maintained with restrooms, next to the gurgling Independence Creek, and only costs \$10 a night.

The last stop was about 40 miles north to Bishop where riders found the Sunland Cemetery out in the southeast

edge of town where Barlow Lane dead-ended (pun intended).

Bishop was the end point and most riders had reservations at the Travelodge (formerly Ramada Inn). Twelve riders met up at the *Back Alley Grill* located in the bowling alleys and had a fun time enjoying a casual dinner and sipping their favorite brews.

Antilla for putting this ride together and also to Mike Barber for helping with the pre-ride! The ride and the camaraderie were enjoyed by all as the event was well planned and provided new places to see.

This Mission is off the beaten path and doesn't benefit from numerous visitors. Despite that they are valiantly trying to restore the mission.

About 25 miles north of the Nacimiento side road, all passed through the Big Sur and then Bixby Bridge about 20 miles south of Carmel. Soon riders passed Carmel, then Monterey and headed into Santa Cruz turning onto I-17 east towards Scotts Valley where they spent the night at the Best Western. Some riders went out to dinner while others got fast food and beer and chilled beside the pool enjoying the evening.

The next day's ride was to be an adventurous one taking riders south to Watsonville and onto state/county roads through the beautiful coastal hills south to riding G12 to US101 into Salinas. Next was CA68 to Laureles Grade Rd (G20) heading south on that until ending at G16. Now, a little word about G16, this is an absolutely beautiful road. It actually originates out of Carmel and is named Carmel Valley Road, West and East. It will take you through some of the most beautiful hills in California. Past ranches, farms, cottages, shacks, climbs, ascents, switchbacks, tree tunnels, State Parks, vineyards, you name what you are looking for and you will find it here. G16 finally drops into Greenfield, at US101 back on the western side of the central valley.

Riders then headed south to the small town of San Lucas, heading east on CA198 to Coalinga. It was here that some of the riders deviated from the route and continued to Harris Ranch and its superb restaurant for an excellent lunch. After a long leisurely lunch they decided to just head south on I-5 and return home. Others, continuing on the route, headed south on CA33, west to CA41 to CA229 enjoying a nice local road before turning onto CA58 and riding through the hills and joining onto CA33 for the beautiful ride into Ojai. These roads are forever favorites of SoCal motorcyclists. They offer awesome views, curves both gentle and tight, and the natural scented air of the coastal hills.

In Ojai they turned east and then south on CA150 leading them into Santa Paula where the ride ended. After riding all these exciting roads it was tough to get on interstates and slab it back home. But the lingering memories of the Pacific Coastal vistas helped the miles pass under the wheels.

The 2015 two tone Indian Chiefs seemed like they would never appear at my local Indian dealership, but in late September, an Indian red and thunder black Chief Classic finally arrived. That day I



bought it...still in the crate, before it had a chance to reach the showroom floor, and the eyes of other Indian hunters.

A couple of days later, I rode the Chief home to meet his new stable mate, my olive green and black 100th Anniversary Harley Davidson Heritage Softail Springer. The colors of these bikes, as well as



their brands, are diametrically opposed, but they must become blood brothers 'cause

they're both stayin' here until further notice! The first thing that had to be

done was to clear up the 111 controversial number on the chief's air cleaner cover. At first alance, it seems to mock Harley's biggest



motor of only 110 cu. in. Well, we've come to an agreement here...that same number also appears on the Springer's odometer, which today


reads exactly 111,000 miles. The Springer has issued a challenge to the Chief to run that many miles! The Chief has accepted the challenge, and therefore will be

allowed to retain those seemingly offensive numbers on the air cleaner cover, but only as a constant reminder of what is expected!



Okay, now that we've gotten past the formalities, it's time to ride! The Chief is from Spirit Lake, lowa, so now I need to show him the roads we travel around here. It's early October, and we've had a few warm and sunny "Indian Summer" days, perfect riding weather, and the trees are starting to show some nice fall color.

For the Chief's first trip, I'd thought of riding north up through Huron, Seneca, and Ottawa counties to cruise along the Lake Erie shoreline, but after reconsidering, decided to head south. I laid out an afternoon loop of about 200-miles, starting with a cut across Tuscarawas County over to New Rumley, Ohio, birthplace of Lt. Col. George Custer... the Chief already knew where he had died! From there we rode along Tappan Lake to





The 2014 Best 15 US Roads Challenge



We are offering the Best 15 US Roads Challenge for the 4th year. The challenge started spontaneously in the spring of 2011 when the American Motorcyclist Association published its Best 15 Roads article. We looked at the list and said, "Hey, that sounds like a challenge! Game on!"

Two riders took the challenge that year: Kathy and Larry Lamarche from Kamloops. We adjusted the challenge roads in 2012 and made one change in 2013. In 2013, eight riders signed up and six completed the ride. The 2014 list of roads is the same as the 2013 list.

You can tour all 15 in any order, any direction and at any time during 2014. Riders may complete the challenge in segments but all miles back and forth to home and on the roads themselves must be on a motorcycle, trike or motorcycle with side car. Gas receipts and photos are required to document your tour. All 15 rides must be completed in the same calendar year (Jan to Dec of the same year).

- 1. NH 112, "Kancamagus Highway" with a side trip up the Mt Washington Auto Road, New Hampshire.
- US 212 and WY 296, "Beartooth Pass" and "Chief Joseph" Highways, Red Lodge, Montana to eastern terminus of WY 296 in Wyoming.
- 3. CA 1, "Coast Highway", Monterey to Morro Bay, California.
- 4. US 12, "Lolo Pass", Lewiston to Lolo, Idaho.
- 5. TN 165, NC 143, US 129, "Cherohala Skyway" and "Tail of the Dragon", Tellico Plains, Tennessee to near Robbinsville, North Carolina to Maryville, Virginia.
- 6. Going to the Sun Road, Glacier National Park, Montana.
- 7. US 550, "Million Dollar Highway", Durango to Montrose, Colorado.
- 8. Blue Ridge Parkway, Any 150-mile continuous segment, North Carolina, Virginia.
- 9. WA-20, "North Cascades Highway", Concrete to Omak, Washington.
- 10. VA-16, "Back of the Dragon", Marion to Tazewell, Virginia.
- 11. Texas Ranch Roads 335, 336 and 337; "The Twisted Sisters", Texas.
- 12. US-16, Custer to Mt Rushmore, South Dakota.
- 13. US-191, "Coronado Trail", Springerville to Three Way, Arizona.
- 14. UT-12, "Journey Through Time Highway", Torrey to Bryce Canyon, Utah.
- 15. US-50, "The Loneliest Road in America", Ely to Carson City, Nevada.

Grand Canyon North Rim Ride – Fall 2014

Yes, once again your road raconteur and reporter, Trash, and his Goldwing trike, Olde Skool, have cheated death. This time it was on a solo 550-mile ride to the North Rim of



the Grand Canyon. During this ride the over for two mostly

trike turned 30,000 miles years of solo

adventures and great memories.

The road to the North Rim lodge stays open until December on a daily use basis depending on snow. The lodge itself closes in mid-October. Also, I wanted to test out my new Roadcrafter jacket and Shoei J-Cruise helmet in the late fall riding conditions -- worked great. On this ride the temperatures were from 40's to low 60's and little snow.

Thursday, Nov. 20 - Las Vedas NV to North Rim, AZ = 275 miles

I rode to just north of St. George UT (120 miles) and turned



east through scenic southern Utah and northern AZ. I passed my motel at Jacobs Lake Inn and headed to the north rim only 42 miles away. The road after I entered the park did have some minor icy sections, but nothing serious for a trike.

The first European known to have viewed

the Grand Canyon was García López de



Cárdenas from Spain, who arrived in 1540. The north rim lodge was originally built in 1928 and is the only lodge-cabin


complex in the national park system. In 1937 it was partly



rebuilt after a fire. When I arrived the temperature is in the upper 40's at the rim and only a little snow in the shaded areas.

There are lots of pine trees on the north rim side of the GC at over 8,000 feet.

The pictures show that the North Rim



Lodge can get serious snow in the winter. Looks like about 6 feet near the front door. The other picture shows it in the summer. Afterwards I head back to the inn for dinner (including hot bean soup) and my warm room TV. I make it back just before dark (4:30PM).

Friday, Nov. 21 - Jacob's Lake Inn to Las Vegas, NV = 230 miles

Deersville, and on around Clendening Lake. After another hour of riding through the woods, across fields and meadows, and along the Tuscarawas River, we reached the town of Coshocton, got gas for the Chief and water for me. The ride continued west along the Walhonding River before turning north toward the Mohican State Forest and into the Mohican State Park. The road in there is through pine forest and along the Clearfork of the Mohican River. This is truly beautiful countryside, and I often do a hundred mile loop from home, just to ride through this state park.

I didn't want to shock the Chief with a sensory overload, so we headed home...me to the house, the Chief to the barn. I think the Chief is going to like it here. I tried to impress him on this ride... and I haven't even shown him Seneca Lake, the Indian Mounds, or Flint Ridge. However, when we got home, the only problem was, the Springer wanted to know where the hell we'd been all day!

It was expensive to stay and eat at the inn, so I beat a hastily retreat early in the morning

(38 degrees). It was 150 miles to the St. George Cracker Barrel breakfast and I arrived in good riding temps. There the trike seems to automatically park itself, so I can see it from my table --- an old Harley habit. I eat and relaxed and read some of my magazines for an hour or so. Then it was off for home (120 miles).

It is always fun to ride through the Virgin River Gorge just south outside of St. George. It

was the most expensive part of the interstate road system to build. Eventually, I arrived home around noon.

Conclusion

This was a very nice ride to a great world-class destination --- the mighty Grand Canyon. I had a good time and adventure. It would have been better

to have stayed at St. George and made the CG ride a day ride. In a few weeks, the next late season trip looks like the scenic and historic Prescott and Sedona AZ areas.

Very Good Warmer riding pants --- I had worn my trusty ventilated riding chaps.

In a few weeks, the next late season trip looks like scenic Prescott and Sedona AZ. This should be about 650 miles in 3 days. I will use Prescott as my base camp for area riding. The Comfort Inn is only a mile from the Cracker Barrel.



Complete all 16 events with NO substitutions and earn everything already listed plus a \$100 discount certificate for the 2015 Three Flags Classic plus a surprise. Not planning on attending the 2015 TFC? In that case, \$100 cash will come your way instead.

*Substitutions

This year, SCMA makes it easier than ever to achieve the award levels listed above. One of SCMA's Premier Events can be substituted for our Bronze, Silver and Gold award levels. However, substitutions cannot be used for the Platinum "Suite 16" award level. It stands alone without substitution

We are offering a new "Triple Crown Bonus". If you complete the Triple Crown in 2014, then you can use ALL THREE of its premier rides to count toward your Traveler's Award for the Bronze, Silver and Gold levels. However, the Platinum level "Suite 16" cannot be substituted. That level will still require all 16 listed qualifying events.

How to Sign Up

Signing up was easy for current SCMA members. Sign-up was at any event through the March 15 St. Pat's Day Run through Mitch Friedman, Traveler's Award Chairman. For an annual fee of \$20 you are registered and a wallet card to maintain your riding record. Your rider fee pays for SCMA's administrative costs-including the cost of the awards listed above.

Other fine print

•Sign the rider's sheet and the release of liability form provided at the start of each qualifying event.

•Report to the Traveler's Award Chairman (TAC) at the start of each event and receive his initialed endorsement on the wallet card that you received when you registered for the Traveler Award Program.

•Complete the entire qualifying event on a motorcycle, trike or a motorcycle with sidecar.

•Show evidence of your visit to any checkpoints established for the event.

•Complete the event in the time specified by the organizer, if specified.

•Report to the TAC at the end of the ride in accordance with his requirements announced at the start of the event.

• If a qualifying event is cancelled because of rain, you will receive qualifying credit unless a "rain day" had been previously announced and calendared by the organizer. In that case, participation on the rain day is necessary to receive credit.

• If a qualifying event is cancelled in advance for a non-rain related reason, the TAC, in consultation with the SCMA board, may schedule and announce a replacement event that requires participation to receive credit. You will receive qualifying credit if a replacement event is not scheduled.

•All decisions of the TAC can be appealed to the SCMA Board of Directors in writing and submitted at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the board.

•Decisions of the board are final.


