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honored to Chair this year. Our committee is very busy preparing for a great 40th annual ride. The ride runs from September 3rd through the 7th but you'll need to sign-in in San Diego on the 2nd.

Registration for this ride opened at midnight on New Year's Eve. Instead of standing next to a loved one at midnight, many SCMA members were waiting to click their mouse in order to obtain a low rider number. And click they did. In the first 35 minutes of the New Year there were 39 registrants. I have to confess I was one of those people and still couldn't get a lower number than six! I am number 6, cool!

As I type this there are now 225 of 300 registrants, a testament to those before me who created a truly special ride 39 years ago.

In 7 days (or less) we will publish the route, along with the hotels for the Start, Finish, and checkpoints. As many of you know, we've already announced the ride runs from San Diego to Victoria B.C. and ends at the Empress Hotel. Route planners are entering the route data into a program to share with registrants. Unlike last year where riders only got information on the forum, we'll send out e-mails to bring registrants up-to-date.

Everyone will get information at the same time and you won't need to read every forum comment to be current. We still encourage you to participate in the forum as riders are always sharing great information.

This ride is filling up quickly so we encourage those of you thinking about doing it to register before it's too late. At this rate the ride could fill up well before the deadline (May 31, 2015).

I look forward to meeting you at the Start hotel and encourage you to make reservations a day or two early because you'll be near a lot to see and right across the street from San Diego Bay and within walking distance to Little Italy and the Gas Lamp District! Take advantage of all San Diego has to offer by getting there early. If you're a registrant look for our e-mail soon and I will see you in September!

USA FOUR CORNER TOURS

Hello, I'm interested in doing the USA Four Corners this summer and need further information. What is the difference between the USA Four Corners and the TRUE X. Do I need to tell the SCMA which ride I want to do before I begin?

Chris,

Once you register for the USA Four Corners you can do either of the rides and no need to advise the SCMA (Dannie Fox, Ride Chair) in advance. Here is the difference between the two.

The regular USA Four Corners consists of visiting: Blaine, WA; Madawaska, ME; Key West, FL; and San Ysidro, CA. in 21 days or less. (About 6,000+ miles not including travel to first corner and ride home)

The USA Four Corners, TRUE X is a variation of the regular Four Corners and is far more challenging. You must begin at one of the Four Corner destinations then travel to Lebanon, Kansas in between each corner, visiting Lebanon a total of 3 times. You have 26 days to complete this 11,000+ mile ride not including travel to first corner and home.

The cost of each ride is the same, \$125. All other rules remain the same and are available on the SCMA website (www.SC-MA.com) and in the Starter package once you register for the ride. Packages for early sign-ups in January will go out in late February or the first two weeks of March.

Three Flags Classic

I recently came across the Three Flags Classic and I'm considering this as my first long distance motorcycle ride in September. I'm a little concerned about the distance. Are all riders "long distance riders" and how big a bike do I need to do this?

Justin,

There is a lot of information I don't know about your skill level or the motorcycle you will be riding so the answer is a little difficult to answer. I would certainly not discourage you from doing the ride, but I would suggest riders with moderate to advanced riding skills take this on. I would also suggest riders take reliable motorcycles given much of the ride is back roads. The higher your skill level the easier it would likely be to navigate a "smaller" motorcycle. I would be familiar with some route planning, but you are provided a turn-by-turn route sheet. In addition, I suggest reading a few books on long distance motorcycling and also familiarize yourself with clothing appropriate for very cold and very hot weather. This particular ride can see both extremes, so better than average riding jacket, boots, and gloves are


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important. A good pair of riding pants are recommended but not critical. If you don't already belong to a motorcycle riding club, join one. You'll undoubtedly meet riders with a great deal of experience. They love to talk about their rides, so ask a few questions and you'll get lots of advice. Also check the SCMA forum under Three Flags Classic for some great information. I recall starting this ride with a fellow who only took a sweatshirt on the ride. Once in the Rockies he had to stop to buy some warmer clothing and gloves. Plan in advance!

Registration closes May 31 for this ride unless full ahead of time, but you'll have ample opportunity to ride 200, 300, 400, and 500 mile days between now and September in preparation for a ride of a lifetime. I hope to see you in September!

If you asked my schedule I'd tell you I'm never late for a 10am meeting so I was out of my element by almost half a day. But 100 miles down the road in Globe there was a McDonalds and I knew they'd have breakfast and coffee waiting. At 3:20am I dropped my



start-card and was rolling by 3:26am.

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little burg along the route had some patrolmen sitting on the roadside, drinking coffee and munching donuts, oblivious to the difference between bikers and motorcyclists. The



SCMA group is definitely more of the latter. I took some amusement in that and shared a good-morning wave as I rolled past, at five under of course.

The stoplight just before Globe was at the top of a hill and I could see the golden arches below. It felt like I was out early but as I approached I could see there were already twenty-some motorcycles in the lot. The latenight skeleton crew was overwhelmed and before long the line was out the door but standing there we soon became fast friends.

We shared a table and over breakfast compared our hotel plans and hopes for the ride. New friends, new roads, we were off to a good start.

At Globe I strayed from the published route and headed northeast towards Holbrooke and Mexican Hat. I rode the Moki Dugway on my way to Hanksville and finished day one at the first checkpoint in Torrey.

An earlier trip that summer had me coming south from Torrey on UT-12 so I took the chance to get my first look at the Glen Canyon NRA. I was at an overlook when another rider pulled in. He was new to touring. His wife and babies were visiting relatives for the weekend and he decided to try something new and adventurous.



We traded cameras and took the requisite photographs of each other near our motorcycles and overlooking the canyon. I told him about the Three Flags. He was amazed that so many people would ride so far but I could see that he was thinking about it. The seed had been planted.

And then there was the couple, also riding the Three Flags, which I stopped from leaving an overlook at Hells Canyon with their keys still in the unlocked latch of their topbox. We traded pleasantries but they were ready to roll. We didn't talk long there on the roadside but did get to reconnect at Tuesday's banquet in Harrison Hot Springs BC.

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And then there was a guy in Scottsbluff last year during the 2013 Three Flags run up to Winnipeg. One of my riding buddies started leaking air out of his rear valve stem. We were at the last stop light just outside of town when we realized he had a problem. We put a compressor on it but it just wouldn't hold air long enough to proceed so we retreated to the nearest gas station. Our options were pretty limited because it was Sunday night, it was a Labor Day weekend and well, we were in Scottsbluff. And it was getting dark with our hotel room still another 100 miles down the road. In desperation we called an 800 number for emergency tire repairs, truck tires that is, farm equipment and semis, the big toys.


A young man answered. He was probably the rookie at the shop, stuck covering the emergency line on a holiday weekend. He was polite and listened to our plea but I could hear the television and children playing in the background. He explained he really didn't know much about motorcycles. He was a real nice guy, a heartland reminder of everything that is good about this country, and happy to help. A quick 90 minutes later we were back on the road and rolling with full tires and a new valve stem. We finally got to our hotel something after midnight but tipped a beer in our new friend's honor, said our thanks and called it a night.

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A little after 1 pm or so, Gonzo received an email from Killer Dan (the Deer Slayer) stating





2015 Triple Crown and Best 15 US Roads

Befitting for the 2015 New Year, the Board of Directors approved including the Best 15 as one of the rides that qualifies for the Triple Crown Award.

The Board acknowledged the traditional intent of the Award was to recognize those riders who accomplished riding three of the majors in a given calendar year (i.e., Jan 2015 thru Dec 2015). In 2008 Riders qualified for the Triple Crown if they completed the Three Flags Classic, USA Four Corners, and the CA Parks Adventure. At the time these were the only Major riding events sponsored by SCMA.

The idea of the Triple Crown, initially proposed by **Mitch Friedman** (#24102) who joined the SCMA in 2007, was championed by **Jan Staws** and other key members of SCMA and was first awarded in 2009. At some point the Missions Tour was added to the list of major events and included as an option to the CA Parks Adventure to qualify for the Triple Crown.


In the spring of 2011 SCMA added the Best 15 to its roster of major events. Our first finishers that year were **Kathy and Larry Lamarche** of Kamloops, Canada. Since inception, the event has only had eleven members, who have successfully finished the event sixteen times, a testament to the difficulty of the ride.

In acknowledging the mileage involved in completing the ride, and the inherent challenge incurred when riding each of the 15 roads, the Board unanimously approved, beginning with 2015, to include the Best 15 USA Challenge as an option to the Parks or Missions tours. Either of those three can be combined with the USA Fours Corners and Three Flags Classic to qualify for the Triple Crown.

To be eligible for the 2015 Triple Crown Award, awarded at the 2016 Awards Banquet, riders must complete the USA Four Corners, Three Flags Classic, and either one of the CA Parks Adventure, CA Missions Tour, or the Best 15 USA Roads Challenge.

2015 Best 15 US Roads Challenge



We are offering the Best 15 US Roads Challenge for the 5th year. The challenge started spontaneously in the spring of 2011 when the American Motorcyclist Association published its Best 15 Roads article. We looked at the list and said, "Hey, that sounds like a challenge! Game on!"

Two riders took the challenge that year: Kathy and Larry Lamarche from Kamloops. We adjusted the challenge roads in 2012 and made one change in 2013. In 2013, eight riders signed up and six completed the ride. The 2015 list of roads is the same as the 2013 list.

You can tour all 15 in any order, any direction and at any time during 2015. Riders may complete the challenge in segments but all miles back and forth to home and on the roads themselves must be on a motorcycle, trike or motorcycle with side car. Gas receipts and photos are required to document your tour. All 15 rides must be completed in the same calendar year (i.e., Jan 2015 to Dec 2015).

Beginning this year, 2015, the Best 15 qualifies for the Triple Crown as an option to the Parks Adventure or Missions Tour.

- 4. US 12, "Lolo Pass", Lewiston to Lolo, Idaho.
- 5. TN 165, NC 143, US 129, "Cherohala Skyway" and "Tail of the Dragon", Tellico Plains, Tennessee to near Robbinsville, North Carolina to Maryville, Virginia.
- 6. Going to the Sun Road, Glacier National Park, Montana.
- 7. US 550, "Million Dollar Highway", Durango to Montrose, Colorado.
- 8. Blue Ridge Parkway, Any 150-mile continuous segment, North Carolina, Virginia.
- 9. WA-20, "North Cascades Highway", Concrete to Omak, Washington.
- 10. VA-16, "Back of the Dragon", Marion to Tazewell, Virginia.
- 11. Texas Ranch Roads 335, 336 and 337; "The Twisted Sisters", Texas.
- 12. US-16, Custer to Mt Rushmore, South Dakota.

Notarized Signatures Required !!!!

Our Risk Manager, Steve Howe, has perhaps the most interesting position in our Association. His task is to ensure that our rides are properly insured. Currently we are insuring rides through the American Motorcycling Association (AMA) who provides us the opportunity to be insured and provides the rules and guidelines to ensure that our waiver and release of liability (ROL) process is as robust as possible. This ROL process, in fact, is one of the cornerstones of the structure that allows us to offer great motorcycling events and challenges.

AMA requires all participants in an event to supply a notarized ROL unless there is a starting point sign-in where a Board member is a witness to the ROL such as we have at the Three Flags Classic and at the Travelers Award rides.

This means SCMA requires a notarized ROL when registering for Four Corners, 15 Best, Parks, and Missions. When preparing your registration forms for any of these four major events, please take the blank ROL (in color) to a Notary Public. Fill in the form as follows:

Print and Sign in the presence of the Notary, and obtain their notary documentation to be submitted with your application. Your notary is your witness when the appropriate notary documentation is submitted.



*Substitutions

This year, SCMA makes it easier than ever to achieve the award levels listed above. One of SCMA's Premier Events can be substituted for our Bronze, Silver and Gold award levels. However, substitutions cannot be used for the Platinum "Suite 16" award level. It stands alone without substitution

We are offering a new "Triple Crown Bonus". If you complete the Triple Crown in 2014, then you can use ALL THREE of its premier rides to count toward your Traveler's Award for the Bronze, Silver and Gold levels. However, the Platinum level "Suite 16" cannot be substituted. That level will still require all 16 listed qualifying events.

How to Sign Up

Signing up was easy for current SCMA members. Sign-up was at any event through the March 15 St. Pat's Day Run through Mitch Friedman, Traveler's Award Chairman. For an annual fee of \$20 you are registered and a wallet card to maintain your riding record. Your rider fee pays for SCMA's administrative costs-including the cost of the awards listed above.

Other fine print

•Sign the rider's sheet and the release of liability form provided at the start of each qualifying event.

•Report to the Traveler's Award Chairman (TAC) at the start of each event and receive his initialed endorsement on the wallet card that you received when you registered for the Traveler Award Program.

•Complete the entire qualifying event on a motorcycle, trike or a motorcycle with sidecar.

•Show evidence of your visit to any checkpoints established for the event.

•Complete the event in the time specified by the organizer, if specified.

•Report to the TAC at the end of the ride in accordance with his requirements announced at the start of the event.

• If a qualifying event is cancelled because of rain, you will receive qualifying credit unless a "rain day" had been previously announced and calendared by the organizer. In that case, participation on the rain day is necessary to receive credit.

• If a qualifying event is cancelled in advance for a non-rain related reason, the TAC, in consultation with the SCMA board, may schedule and announce a replacement event that requires participation to receive credit. You will receive qualifying credit if a replacement event is not scheduled.

•All decisions of the TAC can be appealed to the SCMA Board of Directors in writing and submitted at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the board.

•Decisions of the board are final.
