

# Letter from the Chairman

While those on the east coast are beginning to thaw out, those of us on the west coast are finding temperatures moderate to downright hot. While riding weather is typically year-round in the west, many start to bring out their motorcycles as we come into spring. This is an excellent time to brush up on perishable riding skills and take special care in checking safety items on our motorcycles.

It's also a good time to self-assess the type of rider you are. Are you a defensive bike rider, aggressive? Do you ride with the flow of traffic or do you find yourself riding faster than traffic? Do you split traffic (California)? Are you riding as safely as possible?

When was the last time you checked your fluid levels, headlights, turn signals, and tire wear? How often do you check your tire pressure, once a week, once a

month, every day? Have you considered the only thing between you and the asphalt are your tires?

I was going to discuss lane splitting, or driving between vehicles on the roadway. California is the only State in

the US that allows it. (The Motorcycle Safety Foundation indicates there are others, but I'm not aware). The basic rationale is California allows lane splitting because motorcycles are safer between vehicles than behind them (rearend collisions). I don't have an opinion about the safety issue concerning lane-splitting other than common sense tactics dictate safer ways to lane split. If you go too fast, you have a greater chance of a collision. If the lanes are too narrow you have a greater chance of clipping a car. If traffic is going fast there is a greater chance of a collision due to a rider's inability to avoid a collision. I lane split when traffic is heavy, very slow, or stopped. I don't like doing it, but I don't I like sitting in traffic, especially on very hot days.

There were recent studies by the CHP which ultimately determined lane splitting wasn't more dangerous than sitting in traffic and getting rearended. They ultimately came out with safety recommendations. A few other States are now considering changing their lane-splitting laws. So enough about lane splitting.

What really caught my eye when doing the research on lane splitting were the statistics from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety (IIHS), Highway Loss Data Institute (HLDI), the California Highway Patrol (CHP), and the National Highway Transportation Administration (NHTSA) regarding motorcycle fatalities in general. I gained a great deal of respect for these organizations because in another life I used to write grants for NHTSA administered by the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS). These folks really do an excellent job in their analysis of collisions and gathering meaningful statistics. By the way, don't ever call a "collision" an "accident" when discussing drunk driving collisions or you'll lose a finger. The California Office of Traffic Safety clearly wants it known DUI driver collisions are not accidents. I never made the mistake a second time.

So here are some interesting statistics from which you can draw your own conclusions. I found them quite interesting. The statistics come from IIHS and HLDI.

From 1975 to 2001, 17% or more of the fatalities involving motorcyclists were 50 years or older.

From 2002 to 2008, 20% or more of the fatalities involving motorcyclists were 50 years or older.

From 2009 to 2013, 30% or more of the fatalities involving motorcyclists were 50 years or older.

This tells me there is a rise in the percentage of fatalities among older riders. Either older riders are losing their skills, older riders are starting to ride later, and don't develop skills; or older riders are really unlucky. I think the latter is likely not the answer.

Here are a couple of other interesting

statistics though I don't believe you can draw too much from these numbers.


The number of motorcycle fatalities in the previous 5 years are listed below:

2013 - 4,3812012 - 4,6952011 - 4,4032010 - 4,3242009 - 4,286

There are too many motorcycle fatalities. The factors for the fatalities vary greatly. Some of the motorcyclists were at fault and many of the fatalities were the cause of other drivers. What is particularly interesting about these fatalities is that about 40%+ are typically solo collisions not involving other motor vehicles. I concluded that many fatalities are caused by the skillset or factors within the control of the rider. It would be fair to say it is in our best interests to maximize our odds by increasing our skillset, taking care of our equipment, and riding within our limits. Please be safe out there as I look forward to waving as I pass you going the opposite direction on the highway.

Eight of the riders were non-SCMA and it was a real pleasure meeting them. Thirteen lady riders enjoyed their cup of Hot Chocolate, courtesy of SCMA,

while Jinky's prepared breakfast orders for the group.

Ride Chair's Lori and Steve Ogden were busy recording everyone's names on the ROL's, collecting \$10 from all the men and 14 cents from all the ladies ©. Slowly the large SCMA crowd began to dwindle as individuals and small groups finished their meals and headed out on the route.





The last group to depart Jinky's was Gonzo's group of six bikes. Gonzo was a little challenged to get off in the right direction. First he missed the turn onto Santa Monica Blvd and made a left at Wilshire. Upon reaching Ocean Ave he made a left instead of a right. Realizing his error, he did a complete loop, passing Jinky's one more time, and finally was on course for the day's ride.

Elsinore to get on the Ortega Highway (CA74). This eastern start on Ortega begins with a fun, twisting and climbing ride to reach the plateau where they




stopped to take a breather , admire the view, and



# Prescott AZ Ride - January 2015

Yes, once again your road raconteur and rogue, Trash, and his loyal Goldwing trike, Olde Skool, have cheated death. This time it was on a solo ride to explore the historic Prescott and Sedona AZ areas. The ride was about 550 miles, plus sightseeing. The temperatures were in the mid 40's to mid 50's range. No problem for



hard-core - take no prisoners riders.



## <u>Thursday</u>, Jan. 8 - Las Vegas to Prescott AZ = 295 <u>miles</u>

It was an easy 120 miles down to Kingman AZ and then

115 miles SE on familiar Hwy 93 to the Prescott turnoff. At the turnoff at Hwy 89 ("The West's Most Western Highway") I headed NE into some low

mountains as Olde Skool went into Battle Attack Mode. As I travel the 60 miles to my motel, I noticed this country seems a little too tame. I decided that I needed to form a **Wild Bunch Rider Gang** to pillage and sack unsuspecting towns and villages along the way --- nothing will be left in our wake but smoking ruins and wanted posters. Now I need to find like-minded riders to form this posse of desperados.

Prescott is known for its western history and cowboy feel. In 1864 Prescott was



designated as the capital of the *Arizona Territory* and today has about 40,000 people. The immediate region around Prescott has about 105,000 people with other small towns. Prescott is home to the downtown historical area known as **Whiskey Row**, until 1956 a notorious

**red-light** district. Prescott also has a place in western folklore with the fact that Virgil Earp, Wyatt Earp's

older brother, lived in Prescott in 1879 and told him of the boomtown in Tombstone, Arizona. It is also rumored that Doc Holliday spent some time in Prescott just before heading to Tombstone (SE 285

miles) and the OK Corral, Oct. 26, 1881. What is interesting too is that Wyatt Earp was in Tonopah and Goldfield NV just north of Las Vegas at various times in the early 1900's.

After checking in at my base camp, the Comfort Inn, I head over to the nearby Cracker Barrel for a nice meal. It was an end to a perfect ride day as darkness settled in.

as I hammered down the road. I had the IPhone loaded with my ride tunes. The old-time history and rascalism of this country fit me perfectly. In AZ I did not see too many other riders. I guess they were at home afraid of a little January winter weather and the big bad wild-west country!



# 2015 Triple Crown and Best 15 US Roads Challenge

Befitting for 2015, the Board of Directors approved the inclusion of the Best 15 as a qualifying ride for the Triple Crown Award.


The Board acknowledged the traditional intent of the Award was to recognize those riders who accomplished riding three of the majors in a given calendar year (i.e., Jan 2015 thru Dec 2015). In 2008 riders qualified for the Triple Crown if they completed the Three Flags Classic, USA Four Corners, and the CA Parks Adventure. At the time those rides were the only Major riding events sponsored by SCMA.

The idea of the Triple Crown, initially proposed by **Mitch Friedman** (#24102) who joined the SCMA in 2007, was championed by **Jan Staws** and other key members of SCMA and was first awarded in 2009. At some point the Missions Tour was added to the list of major events and included as an option to the CA Parks Adventure to qualify for the Triple Crown.


In the spring of 2011 SCMA added the Best 15 to its roster of major events. Our first finisher's that year were **Kathy and Larry Lamarche** of Kamloops, Canada. Since inception, the event has only had eleven members, who have successfully finished the event sixteen times, a testament to the difficulty of the ride.

In acknowledging the mileage involved in completing the ride, and the inherent challenge incurred when riding each of the 15 roads, the Board unanimously approved, beginning with 2015, to include the Best 15 USA Challenge as an option to the Parks or Missions tours. Either of those three can be combined with the USA Fours Corners and Three Flags Classic to qualify for the Triple Crown.

To be eligible for the 2015 Triple Crown Award, awarded at the 2016 Awards Banquet, riders must complete the USA Four Corners, Three Flags Classic, and either one of the CA Parks Adventure, CA Missions Tour, or the Best 15 USA Roads Challenge.

## 2015 Best 15 US Roads Challenge



We are offering the Best 15 US Roads Challenge for the 5th year. The challenge started spontaneously in the spring of 2011 when the American Motorcyclist Association published its Best 15 Roads article. We looked at the list and said, "Hey, that sounds like a challenge! Game on!"

Two riders took the challenge that year: Kathy and Larry Lamarche from Kamloops. We adjusted the challenge roads in 2012 and made one change in 2013. In 2013, eight riders signed up and six completed the ride. The 2015 list of roads is the same as the 2013 list.

You can tour all 15 in any order, any direction and at any time during 2015. Riders may complete the challenge in segments but all miles back and forth to home and on the roads themselves must be on a motorcycle, trike or motorcycle with side car. Gas receipts and photos are required to document your tour. All 15 rides must be completed in the same calendar year (i.e., Jan 2015 to Dec 2015).

# Beginning this year, 2015, the Best 15 qualifies for the Triple Crown as an option to the Parks Adventure or Missions Tour.

# Notarized Signatures Required !!!!

Our Risk Manager, Steve Howe, has perhaps the most interesting position in our Association. His task is to ensure that our rides are properly insured. Currently we are insuring rides through the American Motorcycling Association (AMA) who provides us the opportunity to be insured and provides the rules and guidelines to ensure that our waiver and release of liability (ROL) process is as robust as possible. This ROL process, in fact, is one of the cornerstones of the structure that allows us to offer great motorcycling events and challenges.

AMA requires all participants in an event to supply a notarized ROL unless there is a starting point sign-in where a Board member is a witness to the ROL such as we have at the Three Flags Classic and at the Travelers Award rides.

This means SCMA requires a notarized ROL when registering for Four Corners, 15 Best, Parks, and Missions. When preparing your registration forms for any of these four major events, please take the blank ROL (in color) to a Notary Public. Fill in the form as follows:



Charter Name: Southern California Motorcycling Association Location: Norwalk, CA Sanction #: use the appropriate Sanction Number Four Corners is 44723, 15 Best is 44724, Missions is 44725, Parks is 44726). Date(s): 01Jan2015-15Dec2015.

Print and Sign in the presence of the Notary, and obtain their notary documentation to be submitted with your application. Your notary is your witness when the appropriate notary documentation is submitted.



13 completed events\* earns a pin, a trophy, a free March banquet ticket and a chance at a \$100 discount certificate for the 2015 TFC to be drawn at the March 2015 Awards and Appreciation Banquet. Winner need not be present.

#### Platinum Award (aka "The Suite 16")

Complete all 16 events with NO substitutions and earn everything already listed plus a \$100 discount certificate for the 2015 Three Flags Classic plus a surprise. Not planning on attending the 2015 TFC? In that case, \$100 cash will come your way instead.

#### \*Substitutions

This year, SCMA makes it easier than ever to achieve the award levels listed above. One of SCMA's Premier Events can be substituted for our Bronze, Silver and Gold award levels. However, substitutions cannot be used for the Platinum "Suite 16" award level. It stands alone without substitution

We are offering a new "Triple Crown Bonus". If you complete the Triple Crown in 2014, then you can use ALL THREE of its premier rides to count toward your Traveler's Award for the Bronze, Silver and Gold levels. However, the Platinum level "Suite 16" cannot be substituted. That level will still require all 16 listed qualifying events.

#### How to Sign Up

Signing up was easy for current SCMA members. Sign-up was at any event through the March 15 St. Pat's Day Run through Mitch Friedman, Traveler's Award Chairman. For an annual fee of \$20 you are registered and a wallet card to maintain your riding record. Your rider fee pays for SCMA's administrative costs-including the cost of the awards listed above.

#### Other fine print

•Sign the rider's sheet and the release of liability form provided at the start of each qualifying event.

•Report to the Traveler's Award Chairman (TAC) at the start of each event and receive his initialed endorsement on the wallet card that you received when you registered for the Traveler Award Program.

•Complete the entire qualifying event on a motorcycle, trike or a motorcycle with sidecar.

•Show evidence of your visit to any checkpoints established for the event.

•Complete the event in the time specified by the organizer, if specified.

•Report to the TAC at the end of the ride in accordance with his requirements announced at the start of the event.

•If a qualifying event is cancelled because of rain, you will receive qualifying credit unless a "rain day" had been previously announced and calendared by the organizer. In that case, participation on the rain day is necessary to receive credit.

•If a qualifying event is cancelled in advance for a non-rain related reason, the TAC, in consultation with the SCMA board, may schedule and announce a replacement event that requires participation to receive credit. You will receive qualifying credit if a replacement event is not scheduled.

•All decisions of the TAC can be appealed to the SCMA Board of Directors in writing and submitted at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the board.

•Decisions of the board are final.
