This is my eighth year of riding motorcycles. I am nowhere near the level of riding expertise of y'all.....you ride circles around me. I point this out because, I am not a "natural" like so many of you,

2019 Mid-Term Election Results All Members Breakfast Meeting

An SCMA All Members Breakfast Meeting was held Saturday June 29th, ostensibly to count ballots and install the newly elected officers.

Per the SCMA Bylaws, as filed for our California charter as an organization, SCMA must hold an Annual All Members Meeting on the last Saturday of April to conduct nominations to elect its Officers to a two-year term. To maintain continuity of operations, SCMA established a cycle of mid-term elections whereby three of the six officer's terms expire each year. Odd years the Chairman, Secretary and Risk Manager are elected; even years the Vice Chairman, Treasurer, and Membership Director are elected.

Ex-Officio Directors are filled by the Chairpersons of each of the Premier Events; 3FC, USA4C, B15, and CA Adventures. When a Premier Ride chairperson is replaced, that person becomes a non-elected Director on the Board with full rights similar to Officers of the SCMA/Board.

This year, only single nominations were received for Chairman and Secretary. No nominations were received for Risk Manager. Since there was only a single nomination for two of the positions, the balloting became a formality, sort of a slam-duck decision as to who will be elected. Despite that, it is necessary to carry on the practice of receiving ballots, establishing a "ballot counting committee", and announcing the results. Continuing this practice keeps us in compliance with our bylaws and keeps the process alive in the minds of our officers.

Although an All Members Meeting is not required for counting of the ballots, the board decided that ballot counting should be done in full transparency....so why not hold an open meeting. In fact, why not make it a sponsored breakfast?

We met at the Elks Lodge in Duarte at 9:00 am with Gerry Delker, Lodge administrator, firing up the stoves in the kitchen and providing the group of 13 attendees (2 online video) with a full up breakfast of juices, pastries, breads, scrambled eggs, hash browns, bacon, ham, sausage links, and lots of coffee. In other words....an AWESOME breakfast!!

Charlie Lamb (VA resident), SCMA's big time distance riding Secretary, was on hand to form the ballot count committee. Charlie was in SoCal to finish up the CA Best 15 Roads and to begin his USA Four Corners Tour.

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While the ballot count was in progress, the rest of us began discussing ride ideas, camping rides, destination rides, camping while riding a Three Flags Classic, and a number of other subjects.

Stories abounded and laughter was amongst the noisy chatter. And then the election news was presented to those assembled

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Grand Tour San Diego Red Hot Riders

Riding in SoCal can be exhilarating and frustrating. SoCal hills, mountains, and deserts offer the best riding fun and gorgeous vistas. SoCal freeways to get anywhere can cause frustration and could lead to insanity.....were it not for CA's Lane Splitting Law.

Friday at 1:00 pm, Mike Barber (former Membership Chair), Pat Julien (Awards Banquet), and I departed Lake Forest in Orange County heading to Santee in San Diego County. Immediately, upon coming down the on-ramp we were confronted with stop-n-go traffic.....we had to lane split.

The normal 90 minute ride took 2.5 hours....yup, a whole extra hour!! Hence the frustration of riding in SoCal with all its millions of cars on the freeways!

But I digress....

We arrived at the Carlton Oaks Country Club, lodge and Resort at 3:30 and got checked in to our rooms. The Hotel seemed to immediately appeal to our discriminatory tastes......rooms were simple cinder block walls (no neighbor noise), the property has an excellent golf course, Pro Shop, restaurant, lounge, and a huge patio well furnished with furnishings and outdoor heaters. Once out on the patio we tagged up with Karen, President of the San Diego Red Hot Riders.

Yes, we needed the heaters. As soon as we split off I-805 onto CA-52 heading east to Santee, the June ocean clouds (with drizzle) rolled in and temperatures dropped to the 60's. By the time the sun had set the air was in the low 60's with a bit of a chill factor.....hence the patio heaters were a welcome accessory!


We ordered 3 or 4 appetizer plates along with glasses of wine. The appetizers and wine were on Happy Hour prices and the food was absolutely delicious!!! It was also very filling so we didn't bother to order an entre.

Entertainment was provided by a solo singer/guitarist who sang/played famous hits of Joplin, Eagles, Elton, Foreigner, etc. She had an amazing voice and talent to render her versions of these great hits. Our evening ended early as we planned to meet in the lounge to have breakfast and conduct the sign-ins for the event.

The restaurant was open at 6:00 am and plenty of tasty coffee on hand! Breakfast matched the quality and quantity of last night's appetizers. Bob and Lisa were not



riding but they were on hand to handle the reservations. Eight of us were on hand for this 2-day event. Jim Branch (former RHR Prez) would be leading the group and Karen would be sweep. Steve Bunis, Bill Kellerman, and Mike Coutts were behind Jim, then Mike and Pat, then me.



Picking up CA-125 S, we worked our way to the Chula Vista Elite Athlete Training Center (Olympic Training Center). We didn't stop for a tour, but it was a neat little visual to see the facility. From there we rode Otay Lakes Rd around the north side of Otay Lake.....pretty cool seeing fishermen in their small boats trying their luck out there.

So far our riding had been brisk on highways; now we were riding country two-lane roads that provided nice and easy warm up curves for me as I hadn't ridden since Thanksgiving. We headed west on CA-94 for an eighth of a mile and then north on Honey Springs Rd to Skyline Truck Trail and followed that into Jamul where we got onto Jamacha Rd leading to CA-94 Campo Rd.

CA-94 is on the CA Best 15 Roads Adventure, one of three rides in the CA Adventure Series. We rode Campo Rd for about 50 miles passing through Jamul (passing the Jamul Casino), through Dulzura, Barrett Junction, the turnoff for the border crossing at Tecate (CA-188), Potrero (a campground is located here), Canyon City (no city here, but there is the Mountain Empire Campgrounds and Campo Creek Vineyards), into Campo (Pacific Southwest Railway Museum here), and into Cameron Corners where we stopped for gas at the Sinclair Gas Station (I got my photo here with the CA-94 signage behind me). This was a great section of riding through the southern San Diego hills....lots of vistas and at times we could see the huge border wall that was erected in the 90's or early 2000's from the ocean at San Ysidro to the bad hills around Jacumbra.

BTW, I think that we crossed the Pacific Crest Trail before entering Campo. And we also rode



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under the massive railroad bridge spanning across CA-94 connecting two big hills somewhere near Cameron Corners.

Riding these roads was fun and enjoyable with the nice weather, clear air, and gentle sweeping turns intermixed with the mild ascents and descents provided by the hills. Every time I am riding these hills along the USA Mexico border I am amazed by the geology. We were alternating between hard packed soil, sandy soil, rocky soil, solid

rocks/boulders jutting upwards. When I see these boulders I always wonder what caused this phenomenon.

After the pit stop we continued on 94/Old Hwy 80 to the Wisteria Candy Cottage to buy chocolates and candies. I loaded up on some tasty looking chocs for my grand kids.

Unfortunately, they melted in the bag while riding in the heat of day-2.

From here we back tracked slightly and took 94 to I-8 west and headed for the Sunrise highway. This was a slab run to make up for lost time taking us west for about 15 miles. I have previously ridden the Sunrise Highway north to south. This time we would be riding it south to north giving us a different view to the roads. As we passed the entry road into Pine Valley (paralleling I-8), I saw about 10 exoctic sports cars....I recognized some of them as Ferrari's and maybe a Corvette. The others



were not identifiable as we zipped by the road.

Soon we were climbing onto the hills of this magnificent road and enjoying the twisting road and sweeping curves. The wind picked up a little here and I could feel the cooling rush of air thru my Darien Aerostich riding suit.

We made a stop at the Kwaaymii Pacific Crest Trailhead and enjoyed the view of Banner Pass, Borrego Springs, and the Salton Sea far in the distance. It was quite windy up here and after chatting a bit with some Christian Riders on Harleys, we mounted up and continued on our way to CA-79 where we hung a left and rode to Lake Cuyamaca for



lunch at the local restaurant and store there.

Our arrival was perfectly times as my stomach announced hunger pangs to me about one mile before we arrived at the restaurant.

Lunch here was a bit slow, but the sandwiches were tasty and camaraderie was exhibited with a lot of banter, discussions and story telling. After a good hour of eating and relaxing we paid our bill, suited up, and mounted our mechanical steeds.

Our route was to retrace our

ride back to where we had entered CA-79 off of the Sunrise Highway but continue on 79 through Julian (think apple pie) and on to CA-78 and other roads getting us back to Santee and the Carlton Oaks Resort.

It was a long day of great riding. Now we needed to shower, grab a bite to eat out on the patio, and then wrap it up for the day!!!

Tomorrow will be day 2 leading us into Idyllwild and then back to our home destinations. That story will be in next month's newsletter.

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California Best 15 Roads

SCMA's CA Adventure Series, a long time favorite amongst the Southwest Region riders and our International and National riders pursuing the Triple Crown, is about to become an even bigger favorite.

Dennis Even, longtime SCMA member, former SCMA Treasurer, former Chair, CA Adventure Series, and recipient of the Legacy Award, has developed the CA Best 15 roads to ride while you're out visiting Parks and Missions. The Board of Directors reviewed and approved the overall concept and approved this second set of books listing the 2019 CA Best 15 Roads.

The concept Dennis and Les Gullery (Shamrock Road Riders) developed consists of 60 fantastic roads in CA broken down to 20 in the North, 20 in the Central, and 20 in the South of California. From that inventory of 60, 15 roads will be selected consisting of 5 each from the North, Central and South areas, to be offered over a four-year period. In years 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 a different set of 5 will be selected from the inventory so that at the end of a four-year period riders will have ridden all 60 of these fantastic highways.

In addition to expanding the CA Adventure Series, a new award titled the CA Triple Crown will be awarded to riders completing the complete series. This award will be similar to the Triple Crown awarded to finishers of three of premier rides.

Below is the 2019 list of CA Best 15 CA Roads you can ride while visiting various parks and missions within California: This is the 2^{nd} of 4 sets of 15 CA Best Roads.

All roads can be ridden in either direction, be sure to obtain your gas or store receipt and write your mileage for the start and for the finish.

Sign up now to ride these great roads in 2019....combine your ride with the Parks and Missions and earn the beautiful California Triple Crown.

California Triple Crown

We have a new challenge for SCMA members.

A challenge that is completely doable, within reach of everyone, especially members in the southwest region or within a few states close to California.

With the introduction of the California Best 15 Roads, SCMA now has 3 rides with destinations that are often co-located with each other.

The Board of Directors came up with the idea of recognizing those riders who successfully complete the full CA Adventure Series in one calendar year between January 1st and November 30th.

We are in the process of designing this award and expect it to be very similar to the SCMA Triple Crown, but will be a slightly different.

The **CA Triple Crown** will join the ranks of the other major awards designed to recognize riders that accomplish riding a significant distance in the calendar year.

Those awards are the **Triple Crown** award for riding three of the premier events, and the **Premier Grand Slam** for riding all six premier events in a single calendar year.

The **California Triple Crown** is defined as completing the full California Adventure Series in one calendar year. There is one year of eligibility, defined as the year a rider registers for the event, to complete the series and qualify for the California Triple Crown

Be one of the few of the SCMA riders to receive this CA Triple Crown and sign up now!!

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Samuel George Turner Member back in the 1970's

Dannie Fox, USA Four Corners chairman (member # 10193) recently received an email from Kathy Walker-Turner whose husband Samuel George Turner was an SCMA member years ago. She had his motorcycle vest and a jacket with various pins and patches on them and wanted to know if SCMA would be interested in having those items. Yes, indeed, we would!

Mrs. Walker-Turner sent them to Dannie with a letter. She explained that they were married long after Sam was riding but he always talked about his riding years. He was from Oxnard, CA in those years and was a pressman for Oxnard's newspaper.

We don't recall seeing an SCMA patch with a number at the bottom, but we have membership pins designed that way. Sam's SCMA patch has a "1" at the bottom-- SCMA was founded in 1968. His five membership pins continue, numbered through "5", for 1972?

The Jamboree pins show the partnership between SCMA, Southern California Motorcycling Association in Southern California and SRRA, Sierra Road Riders Association in Northern California. It wasn't unusual for riders to run up and down the length of the state to attend each other's weekend rides.

I hadn't realized the Jamboree was a joint event with SRRA. I do know that the annual Jamboree



served as the annual all-member meeting for SCMA, in keeping with SCMA's bylaws. With just SCMA's huge membership in the '70's, the Jamboree was quite an event. We joined SCMA in 1978. Dannie came home saying it had about 9,000 riders. That number was poo-pooed by some in the '90's, but supported again by past chairmen whom I interviewed for the Legacy Award in the 2000's. One was certain his membership was in the 8,000 range.


As a joint venture with SRRA no wonder the Jamborees were huge. We were at one or two, the 1978 and 1979 Jamborees at the Kern County Fairgrounds in Bakersfield, CA. Bakersfield was about the same travel distance for SCMA and SRRA. There were vendors' booths set up in one fair building. scheduled meetings, workshops, and skill riding contests. (and FOOD.)

It looks like Sam was riding a "Honda Four", perhaps a 750, one of the new four-cylinder bikes Honda began putting out in

about 1969. Check that Honda pin on the vest, with the "flying Honda wheel." Does anyone else remember that one? And his Mason pin, nice touch.

We recall the Party Time club patch, too. Handling it as I unpacked the vest, the embroidery is machined, but "rough." It is not at all "satiny" like embroidery work now. It's all "history."

Sam's Jamboree pins are dated 1975, 1977, and 1978. 1978 is the date on the round pin for a Pasadena Motorcycle Club's Poker Run. Even though we lived in Ventura, CA just across the Santa Clara River from Oxnard and obviously attended the same events, we didn't get to know Sam Turner, among the thousands

My Little Problem A Triple Crown Confession (in three parts) Part Two

In 2016 and 2017 Norm and I did some other big IBA rides such as the 48 States Plus Alaska in 10 Days and the National Parks Tour Master Traveler Gold certificate. I also participated in the Three Flags Classic (3FC) in 2017 for the first time, riding from Abbottsford, BC to Puerto Penasco, Mexico whereas Norm had done the 3FC three times. Of course, my little problem had Norm and I also working towards the Team Strange Love & Merci Grand Tour and IBA National Parks Silver Challenge during the 3FC so we made a few little detours from the official 3FC route.

Which brings us to 2018 and more exciting SCMA Rides.

Norm and I were lucky to have one day in April where we could escape Canada in -5C (23F) weather on our

way to the last Moonshine Lunch Run. For the next 10 days our families and friends kept telling us how it got colder and was snowing at home. After Moonshine we headed for Texas and the MotoGP race.

But, you know about my little problem.

We were also working towards another IBA National Parks certificate plus the SCMA's Best 15 Roads challenge. In the week between Moonshine and MotoGP we visited



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ten National Parks & Historic Sites including riding through Big Bend National Park in Texas. The latter, along with the Three Twisted Sisters, began our assault on the Best 15 Roads.

After enjoying spectacular weather and a wonderful day of MotoGP racing at the Circuit of the Americas we headed west and bagged another Best 15, Arizona Hwy 191. This long and winding Best 15 was part of an IBA Saddlesore 1000 mile day during which we gained two hours on time zone changes between Kerrville, TX and Flagstaff, AZ. On the remainder of our route home we planned to ride two more Best 15 Roads – California's Hwy 70 and US12, Lolo Pass, in Idaho.


But, you know about my little problem.

Since we needed to visit at least 50 National Parks for the IBA National Parks challenge, and we had to ride through California for the SCMA Best 15 Roads challenge, we might as well do the CA Parks Adventure at the same time. Over the course of eight days we visited 24 National Parks which took quite a bit of planning and plotting due to the days and hours the parks are open plus the parking restrictions at Eugene O'Neill and now Muir Woods. But, all the planning, plus a little luck along with reduced traffic at the end of April, as opposed to trying this in the middle of summer, paid off.

Now, since we had started the Best 15 Roads challenge and would have to go to Maine and New Hampshire for a couple of the roads it seemed to make sense that we should do the Four Corners again. But, we'd already done that so why not tackle the True-X? But, what to do on our way to Maine?

Well, you know about my little problem.

The IBA has a challenge that only three people had completed when I first started planning. It is called the Far North Insanity (FNI) and requires a rider to visit all ten Canadian Provinces plus the two road-accessible Territories in 14 days or less. Our friend Don, who has earned two SCMA Triple Crowns, decided to join



Norm and I for the FNI. Since Don was also working on the 2018 Team Strange Melting Pot Grand Tour we worked in a few stops along the way for Don as well as numerous National Parks for our IBA Parks Tour. We completed the FNI in eight days and then parted ways for our further challenges.

Norm and I crossed Acadia National Park, the Kancamagus Scenic Byway, Blue Ridge Parkway and West Virginia 33 off our Best 15 list before doing an IBA Saddlesore 1000 through Lebanon, KS for our first visit to the center of the USA. Norm didn't feel up to spending two more weeks on the road so headed for home. I got my San Ysidro corner photo halfway through another IBA Saddlesore 1000 ride from Cedar City, UT and back, and then

rode UT 12 and Colorado's Million Dollar Highway on my return trip to Lebanon to cross off two more Best 15.

This second stop in Lebanon was pretty special. As I got off my bike a vehicle pulled in behind me at the pumps and then I heard a voice asking if I was doing the True-X? It turned out to be Lebanon resident and 2017 True-X Finisher Karen Herndon and, after chatting about our rides, she took my picture at the gas station to make my second visit official.

Between Lebanon and Key West I only had one planned extra stop and that was in Florida at the DeSoto

National Memorial to go towards my quest for IBA Parks Gold certification. I spent a night at my buddy Eric's place in Sarasota and he gave me some good advice about Atlanta. On my way down I had taken the I-285 ring road but he said that I-75/85 right through the middle of Atlanta has an HOV lane that motorcycles can use and it is quicker than the ring road. So very true and this also gave me a chance to get the Park Stamp from the Martin Luther King Jr. National Historic Park in the middle of Atlanta on my way back north.

I have to mention Key West just because I never thought I'd ride there once, nevermind twice. My SPOT Tracker and the SPOTWalla web site are both fantastic tools for peace of mind for my family and friends when I am off riding around like this and one of my friends, SCMA Social Media Guru Reuben Friesen, was watching as I headed for Key West. Unbeknownst to me there is a webcam at the corner and Reuben grabbed a screenshot from the webcam as I was getting my corner picture taken. Pretty cool!

My third visit to Lebanon, KS also came during an IBA Saddlesore 1000 ride from Oak Grove, KY to Ogallala, NE. It's always nice to pick up a time zone change or two when doing an IBA ride.

From Ogallala I just had four Best 15 Roads left to ride and they were all favorites I had previously ridden. Iron Mountain Road in South Dakota's Black Hills, Chief Joseph Hwy and Beartooth Pass in Wyoming, Montana's Going-to-the-Sun Road, and Hwy 20 through the North Cascades led me to Blaine, Washington for my final True-X corner picture after 17 days of the allowed 26. I spent a night at my sister's place in Mission, BC and then headed for home finishing off 31 days and 32,689 km (20,312 miles) and capping a Triple Crown summer.


Near the end of my True-X I looked at my SPOTWalla track and realized my final track would create a reasonable facsimile of a Caribou all across North America. What fun!

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Mexico Motorcycle Liability Insurance

(You must have a paper copy of your Mexican Insurance when Checking-in for 3FC19 at the SLRC check-in desk. You also must present a valid driver's license.)

It is a Mexico law that you have Mexico Automobile Liability Insurance to enter the country. This liability insurance protects you against claims of damages or injuries you caused to others. It does NOT cover damage to your motorcycle or medical coverage for yourself. For that you must purchase the full coverage – When calling to purchase your insurance, if you want full coverage you MUST ask for it.

You can purchase your insurance from any of the providers listed below by either going online, calling them directly, or visiting their offices.

It is highly recommended that you purchase your insurance BEFORE departing on your trip as there is no guarantee an office would be open for business at the time that you would be knocking on their door.

(Remember to bring a paper copy of your Mexican Insurance to the Checkin for the Start)



Garmin and Base Camp


For Garmin products you need Basecamp, a free download from Garmin.

Status Report (eBlast #4) on 3FC19 Hotels at Start and Finish

It is now April, and 4.5 months or so to the final push of getting all our gear in place for the check-in process in San Luis Rio Colorado (SLRC). Despite a few challenges, the 3FC19 Committee continues moving forward in getting all details finalized.

Let's go over some of the details"

- 1. Start and finish locations finalized SLRC Sonora Mexico and Vernon BC Canada. Item #7 below addresses hotel reservations.
- 2. Route and checkpoint were determined. However, a pre-ride recently completed by Paul Lax identified some issues with day 1 routing. Paul and Steve Andrus are redesigning that portion of the route. As soon as that is completed we will release a turn by turn for all.
- 3. Physical location of each checkpoint will soon be identified. Once Paul has the route completed he will begin making arrangements for check-in locations within the checkpoint cities.
- 4. A logo design has been completed but is awaiting the final mileage pending Steve and Paul's final route design. This logo is being shopped to the buckle manufacturer for initial consideration to start the buckle design.
- 5. The committee is considering some pin and patch designs as an alternative to the designed logo. Hat and t-shirt designs are now in progress.
- 6. The big challenge has been with arranging start and finish hotels; we're please to announce that arrangements are completed.
- 7. Hotel Araiza has an English speaking staff to take reservations via telephone. Hotel San Angel has part-time English-speaking staff. For the other three, non-English speaking hotels in SLRC, registration will be facilitated by the Mayor's Office of Tourismo via an email reservation process to be handled by their English-speaking staff.
