# 2019 Mid-Term Election Results All Members Breakfast Meeting

An SCMA All Members Breakfast Meeting was held Saturday June 29<sup>th</sup>, ostensibly to count ballots and install the newly elected officers.

Per the SCMA Bylaws, as filed for our California charter as an organization, SCMA must hold an Annual All Members Meeting on the last Saturday of April to conduct nominations to elect its Officers to a two-year term. To maintain continuity of operations, SCMA established a cycle of mid-term elections whereby three of the six officer's terms expire each year. Odd years the Chairman, Secretary and Risk Manager are elected; even years the Vice Chairman, Treasurer, and Membership Director are elected.

Ex-Officio Directors are filled by the Chairpersons of each of the Premier Events; 3FC, USA4C, B15, and CA Adventures. When a Premier Ride chairperson is replaced, that person becomes a non-elected Director on the Board with full rights similar to Officers of the SCMA/Board.

This year, only single nominations were received for Chairman and Secretary. No nominations were received for Risk Manager. Since there was only a single nomination for two of the positions, the balloting became a formality, sort of a slam-duck decision as to who will be elected. Despite that, it is necessary to carry on the practice of receiving ballots, establishing a "ballot counting committee", and announcing the results. Continuing this practice keeps us in compliance with our bylaws and keeps the process alive in the minds of our officers.

Although an All Members Meeting is not required for counting of the ballots, the board decided that ballot counting should be done in full transparency....so why not hold an open meeting. In fact, why not make it a sponsored breakfast?

We met at the Elks Lodge in Duarte at 9:00 am with Gerry Delker, Lodge administrator, firing up the stoves in the kitchen and providing the group of 13 attendees (2 online video) with a full up breakfast of juices, pastries, breads, scrambled eggs, hash browns, bacon, ham, sausage links, and lots of coffee. In other words....an AWESOME breakfast!!

Charlie Lamb (VA resident), SCMA's big time distance riding Secretary, was on hand to form the ballot count committee. Charlie was in SoCal to finish up the CA Best 15 Roads and to begin his USA Four Corners Tour.

# Grand Tour San Diego Red Hot Riders (Day 2)

After completing Day 1 of the San Diego Grand Tour, we enjoyed a nice dinner on the patio of the restaurant at the Carlton Oaks Resort Golf Course. Dinner and wine was enlivened with an evening of live music performed solo by a young lady with an amazing voice and guitar.

We called it a night after listening to great music and planned to meet for breakfast at &:00 with a 8:00 start from the parking lot.

Breakfast was in the same restaurant and we all agreed it was fantastic. It took me about two cups of coffee to finally wake up....or maybe it was the chitchat and anticipation of the day's ride. Destination today will be Idyllwild in the San Bernadino National Forest. We will be up in altitude, so hopefully the temps will be cooler.

We worked our way out of Santee and got onto CA-67 heading north to Ramona. Once we were out of the congestion of CA humanity, we enjoyed the open hills, riding past the big reservoir and leaning slightly into the sweeping turns as we wound our way through San Diego County's beautiful hills. We turned onto CA-79E and headed to Santa Ysabel for the junction with CA-79. Santa Ysabel is one of my favorite little junctions in CA. You can approach it coming east on CA-76 that starts in Oceanside on I-5 and takes you past the Pala Casino before joining onto 79. Coming from this direction you will notice the Julian Pie Company store. We always stop there for a piece of pie and coffee. If you are coming into Sta Ysabel via CA-78 from Ramona, you will see Dudley's Bakery.....a place that has the most amazing pasteries!!

Now, you ready for this? It was only last year that I connected the dots and realized Dudley's and Julian Pie Co were co-located!! Talk about being a slow thinker 🕾!!!

Heading east on CA79 we rode past the junction where 76 ends and continued on through the hills passing the San Filipe Rd turn off (S2). We continued through the gorgeous hills past Warner Springs, and rode along the east side of Palomar Mountain and State Park (Observatory) then headed north on CA-371 in Aguanga. This seemed like a very gentle, level boring road for about 16 miles before we entered some hills...I got a bit excited thinking we were really heading into the mountains....but not so.

CA-371 T-bones at CA74, the Pines to Palms Hwy. This was one of the CA Best 15 roads last year and was the subject of an article in the August edition of Rider Magazine. Right at the corner is the Paradise Valley Café where Mike Barber and I stopped last year to have a piece of pie and coffee while riding CA-74.

At the T-bone junction we turned left heading west to Mountain Center to get on CA-243N. Now the fun started and we began entering some turns as we climbed the mountain. It was a real pleasure to smell the pines once again. But within a few miles, perhaps 5 miles, we entered Idyllwild and pulled into the Mile High Café. This actually was perfect timing for the day to get a rest stop and have some lunch. The Café was packed, but soon we got a table and thoroughly enjoyed our sandwiches and salads!

Back on our bikes, refreshed from lunch and rest, we continued north on 243 climbing higher into the mountain and experiencing more twisties.....but not tight ones. And this is where an interesting adventure began.

Now, a point to be made here; CA-243 is one of this year's CA Adventures Best 15 Roads. It is an awesome road to ride from Mountain Center, up to altitude with great vistas and fresh air enjoyed in the cool breeze, then down into Banning. The



problem however, is that due to the recent heavy rains, a landslide has taken out a section of road between Lake Fulmor and Banning. Hence, the road is closed at Lake Fulmor. It is also closed somewhere farther down from Lake Fulmor. Riders from Banning can only go so far before reaching the roadblock. Riders from Mountain Center can only reach Lake Fulmor before encountering the other road block. Somewhere, between the two roadblocks, is the landslide that CalTrans has been working on for about a month (as of June).

So, back to the story, off we go from the Café, climbing and twisting to our heart's delight, for about 14 miles until reaching Lake Fulmor. We parked our bikes, checked out the roadblock and the lake (chatted with a few fishermen) and then were getting ready to



suit up. This is when we heard a Harley engine coming up the road from the other side of the roadblock!

We could see the rider approaching the big concrete road barriers and the huge tractor that blocked the road. He stopped shut the engine off and started checking things out. We don't know how he circumvented the northern roadblock, but we figured he'd start up his bike and head back down to Banning.

We were just putting our helmets

on when we heard the Harley engine fire up, then high rev's, a loud thud, and silent engine. Ooops.....what happened?

I decided to walk over and take a look, and to my surprise, saw the Harley and its big rider off the road and in the ditch.....stuck in sand, wedged against a small tree. Could anything get worse? It appears that the rider decided he could run the Harley up the berm and gun it through the sand. But it didn't work.



I approached the rider, who was pulling bushes out of his fenders, and asked, "What's the plan Big Guy??"

He didn't have one.....other than to gun the bike through the sand.

Mike and I decided to help him by pushing the bike while he gave it the gas. It worked out perfect as we got him out of the ditch and into a position where he could then crossover via some solid ground (I'm pointing at the track for him to take) then up over the low sand berm lining the road and get back on asphalt on the other side of the roadblock.

Somehow this guy made it with minimum damage to his Ultra.....Later we were chatting and he said, "I had real big brass ones when I started over the berm, but when I dropped into the ditch and tree they became small brass ones."

With that exciting adventure over, we mounted our bikes and headed down 243 to

Idyllwild and Mountain Center, back to 271 at the Paradise Valley Café and to Aguanga where Mike and I split away from the RHR's and we headed to Temecula and I-15N.

We both expected to encounter bad traffic, and we did for a few miles, but overall we flew down the interstate and were home Lickety Split.

This was an excellent adventure for SCMA.....we got to see new roads, restaurants, hotels, and a Harley riding in a sandy ditch!! What more could we ask for??

Many thanks to Karen Butterfield, Jim Branch, and the Red Hot Riders for a great riding weekend!! And thank you for arranging for the Harley rider to show up!!

# California Best 15 Roads

SCMA's CA Adventure Series, a long time favorite amongst the Southwest Region riders and our International and National riders pursuing the Triple Crown, is about to become an even bigger favorite.

Dennis Even, longtime SCMA member, former SCMA Treasurer, former Chair, CA Adventure Series, and recipient of the Legacy Award, has developed the CA Best 15 roads to ride while you're out visiting Parks and Missions. The Board of Directors reviewed and approved the overall concept and approved this second set of books listing the 2019 CA Best 15 Roads.

The concept Dennis and Les Gullery (Shamrock Road Riders) developed consists of 60 fantastic roads in CA broken down to 20 in the North, 20 in the Central, and 20 in the South of California. From that inventory of 60, 15 roads will be selected consisting of 5 each from the North, Central and South areas, to be offered over a four-year period. In years 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 a different set of 5 will be selected from the inventory so that at the end of a four-year period riders will have ridden all 60 of these fantastic highways.

In addition to expanding the CA Adventure Series, a new award titled the CA Triple Crown will be awarded to riders completing the complete series. This award will be similar to the Triple Crown awarded to finishers of three of premier rides.

Below is the 2019 list of CA Best 15 CA Roads you can ride while visiting various parks and missions within California: This is the  $2^{nd}$  of 4 sets of 15 CA Best Roads.

All roads can be ridden in either direction, be sure to obtain your gas or store receipt and write your mileage for the start and for the finish.

Sign up now to ride these great roads in 2019....combine your ride with the Parks and Missions and earn the beautiful California Triple Crown.

# California Triple Crown

We have a new challenge for SCMA members.

A challenge that is completely doable, within reach of everyone, especially members in the southwest region or within a few states close to California.

With the introduction of the California Best 15 Roads, SCMA now has 3 rides with destinations that are often co-located with each other.

The Board of Directors came up with the idea of recognizing those riders who successfully complete the full CA Adventure Series in one calendar year between January 1st and November 30th.

We are in the process of designing this award and expect it to be very similar to the SCMA Triple Crown, but will be a slightly different.

The **CA Triple Crown** will join the ranks of the other major awards designed to recognize riders that accomplish riding a significant distance in the calendar year.

Those awards are the **Triple Crown** award for riding three of the premier events, and the **Premier Grand Slam** for riding all six premier events in a single calendar year.

The **California Triple Crown** is defined as completing the full California Adventure Series in one calendar year. There is one year of eligibility, defined as the year a rider registers for the event, to complete the series and qualify for the California Triple Crown

Be one of the few of the SCMA riders to receive this CA Triple Crown and sign up now!!

How to turn my little problem into your little problem:

I must say that organizations like the IBA and the SCMA are outstanding in creating challenging rides that get people out and exploring on their motorcycles. Doing a Saddlesore 1000 mile ride is a good challenge but after you've done that a few times it's good to have something more challenging than just rolling down the highway. I've really enjoyed the IBA National Parks Tours that I've done as they get you off the main highways and into some terrific scenery or places where you can learn some history. By combining the various rides there is even more incentive to get out and ride and explore. I find planning these big trips almost as invigorating as the actual riding since the research required into operating hours and time zones and planning a route can lead to some surprising options and combinations.

Hopefully this little tale has provided some incentive to sign up for some of these great rides that the

SCMA offers as they truly are exceptional experiences. You don't have to stack the rides up like I have done but you can if you want to. Either way, there are great challenges out there and a motorcycle is a fantastic way to explore our countries. The folks who put these rides together (Bob, Dannie, Dean, and Gonzo in 2018) do an outstanding job and everyone should take advantage of their efforts. I have now received all of my SCMA certificates and plaques and the buck knife plus the trophy for my 2018 Triple Crown Summer and I must say I am impressed and happy with the mementoes.




#### For the curious people out there

This was how we got through the 24 National Parks in eight days (follow along on the two CA Parks maps). As mentioned, we spent the night in Flagstaff, AZ and we were up and away early but had to stop in Kingman so Norm could get new tires. His rear was wearing off fast due to the speed and temperature in Texas and he'd picked up something in his front tire that seemed to be resistant to plugs. Luckily, we carry all the tools needed to get the tires off in the parking lot so don't have to wait for shop space. After the new rubber got mounted we were off and got to Cesar E. Chavez National Monument (Yellow #10) to collect our first stamp. We then rode spectacular Hwy 33 thru Ojai but found that all the hotels in Ventura were filled up for a tennis tournament so headed over to the Quality Inn in Camarillo. In the morning we backtracked to Ventura to get our Channel Islands (Yellow #22) stamp then collected the Santa Monica Mtns (#24) stamp before catching the 405 and 5 down to San Diego and the Cabrillo National Monument (#31). From here we headed up the I-15 and across the 371 and 74 (love this road!) down into Palm Desert. Before ending our day in Twentynine Palms we collected our stamp at the Joshua Tree Visitor Center (#40) in Joshua Tree. The reason for this big loop is that Mojave isn't open on Tues and Wed so we had to kill off two days after the


MotoGP race in Texas. The Kelso Depot doesn't open until 10 AM but some staff were arriving as we did around 9:30 and let us in early to get our stamps (#46). From here it was on to Death Valley (#52) and Manzanar (#58) before a good push around to Fresno for the night.

Day four took a couple of unexpected turns. We got in to Yosemite on time only to find that I had missed

the fact that the Wawona Visitor Center didn't open until the following week. This forced us to ride right into the Yosemite Valley to collect our stamp (#68). By the time we got back to Fresno it was obvious I would need a new rear tire before the weekend was over and there would be too much delay if I didn't change it now. After getting my new tire we got to Sequoia (#75) and Kings Canyon (#76) with less than 30 minutes to closing time and then headed for King City for the night.



Day five was going to be challenging since we were heading into San Francisco and had two time sensitive stops. But first we had to visit Pinnacles (#86) which didn't open until 9:30. After collecting our stamps we were off to Danville and the uncertainty of the shuttle to Eugene O'Neill (#90). This stop had been planned for a Saturday since an extra shuttle runs and no reservations are required. We arrived in plenty of time to have a snack while waiting for the 12:15 shuttle and then, on our way up to the site, we were able to talk the shuttle driver into bringing us right back down so we didn't have to wait the entire two hours that a normal tour takes. This saved our day and likely the next day. We noticed the streets were full of Girl Scouts when we stopped at the San Francisco Maritime NHS (#95), collected the Golden Gate NRA stamp (#96) at the Presidio Visitor Center, and then ran into the Girl Scouts again at Fort Point (#99). The entire waterfront area was closed off for the Girl Scouts Bridging Event so we had to park on Lincoln Blvd and walk down to get our Fort Point stamp. This nearly wiped out our time savings from Eugene O'Neill. But we were far from being done. We got up to Point Reyes (#102) and then back to Muir Woods (#105) in time for our reserved parking time which we'd booked six weeks ahead and had a two-hour window to make. Stamp collected, we headed for Martinez and a hotel across the street from our next park. The John Muir NHS (#110) doesn't open until 10 AM but again we were lucky in having staff let us in early to get our stamps when they found out that was all we wanted. From here we back-tracked to Rosie the Riveter (#112) and then got onto I-5 North for the trip to Redding. We collected our stamps at Whiskeytown (#119) and, with just 20 minutes to spare, the Thomas J. Kuchel Visitor Center at Redwood (#124) ending our day at a hotel we'd booked in Arcata in case we hadn't made it to Redwood before closing.

Day seven was the only day that we did not collect any Park Stamps but we did ride Best 15 Hwy 70, the Feather River Scenic Byway, from Oroville to Quincy, and ended our day in Red Bluff. Day eight of our whirlwind tour took us to Lassen Volcanic (#146) and Lava Beds (#153) National Parks before we headed for Lolo Pass and the final Best 15 for this tour. As mentioned, in spite of a couple hiccups, our in-depth planning of the opening days and hours plus a couple lucky breaks really made this CA Parks Adventure a success.

#### A little tech talk

I've been running Motul 5100 semi-synthetic oil for a few years and have had it tested after 25,000 KM (15,500 miles) and it has been OK but I wouldn't want to push it much beyond that. For the FNI/True-X trip I did change oil at the halfway point (~16,000 km) and I went to the Darkside running a car tire on the rear of my Honda ST1300 as I didn't want to take the time to change tires during the trip. Of course, unless you are trying to be a Gold Four Corners True-X Finisher there is plenty of time to do either Four Corners version and still change tires and oil.

When you decide to ride the USA Four Corners Tour or the Best 15 US Roads, it only takes a little bit more to add another SCMA Premier Ride and receive SCMA's Premier Triple Crown award.

Congratulations Bruce on earning your Premier Triple Crown. Thank you for showing how it's done and thank you for submitting your story for the Newsletter!!



# Six Ladies on a Mission!

The trip started on June 17<sup>th</sup>, 2019 in Key West Florida, (it is rainy season in the south). We rode into the Keys on Sunday with cloudy skies and a light sprinkle. We can do this, not too big of a deal. We get to our hotel, Not Your Average Hotel with all six of us sleeping in the same room. Bobbi called it the Zoo. "There were five phone windows open, a light was on, and I have no idea where the music is coming from".

We woke up extra early to re-pack, get pictures and get our gas!! Let's get this party started!!! We stop to get gas saying: three get gas, and three go use the facilities. Great plan, right? That never worked out just right.

The rain got heavier the farther away from the Keys we went. By the time we got to Miami it was like trying to ride through ponds! At the 2<sup>nd</sup> gas stop there was a "ta da" moment. Can any of you say you have parked your bike on the curb? Well she stuck the landing! It took all six of us to get that big Harley off the curb. It was raining too hard to see any major damage. Next there was a warning light on the Indian so before we get out of Florida we get that looked at! Better safe than sorry, right? It was pouring rain the whole way! About the time we get back on the road, we figure we are close to Karrie's house and we can spend a free night there and do some laundry, (most of us only packed for 3 days) so why not? Not a huge mileage day 320 miles but we had some trying times.

We head out after yummy breakfast and clean dry clothes! We made 609 miles day 2, with rain pretty much the whole dang day! This repeated for the next 10 days going up the east coast and across part of the Midwest. Oh, while we are there, throw in a Bear (right up by the guard rail) in PA, and I can't remember if the orange barrel that the semi threw at Bobbi was the same day or not. Luckily, the next day we all missed hitting the ladder that was laying across two lanes!

On up to Corner #2. Wow, what a great park Joe has up there! Three of us went into Canada just because we could. It was worth it, even with a grated bridge. We even got to meet some locals that lived where the 4 corners park is. The roads were tricky, but the scenery is just too beautiful to care. We even found the other end of Highway 1. There were moose spotted on Highway 11, oh the goose bumps. We had 5 sena headsets, three of us are connected on one group and two are connected in the other. I honestly feel like this helped keep us safe throughout the whole trip. We could warn each other of road hazards and ask for breaks when needed. We started to enjoy Red bull, and all their flavors, about the time we made it to Maine. This is not a trip for the weak, it is endurance for sure! We were sore by day 3, and by day 5 or 6 we were not; motorcycle conditioning at its best. We made it to Erie, PA and decided we needed a down day. Laundry needed done again and we just needed time to rest a little more. Our typical day has morphed into leaving the hotel by 8ish and getting off the road by 7ish, and that my friends are long days on two wheels! Two longtime friends came to visit and looked at the curb jumping Harley that is now blowing oil back all over Karen's left leg. Karen has been keeping the oil level under close observation. Vickie, our Indian Rider, was having issues seeing through all the rain and her windshield. The friends that came and visited thought they had a short

windshield at home that would fit her bike and offered to install it the next day as we traveled past their home. They brought puppies for all of us to get out puppy fix! Just what we needed! Well we got about 10 miles down the road and Karen's side bag started throwing items of clothing at us! We pulled over to find out she lost her warmest jacket, four corners hat and fingerless gloves. So now we check our bags to make certain they are buttoned down. The next major event was riding thru downtown Chicago in the hail. Cookie's kill switch was hit by the hail, which is the first time I've ever heard of that happening. Here comes the rain again, we stop under an overpass to put on the rain gear again (why we even bother taking it off is still a mystery to me). Bobbi forgot to put her riding jacket back on and rode off with it laying on the back of her bike. It took a beating from the traffic that ran it over and the pouring rain even washed the mysterious pink stain away. She noticed it missing at the gas station we pulled off to wait out the storm. She headed back out in the lighting to recover her jacket. The gas station took a direct hit from lighting and lost power. Bobbi got a speeding ticket trying to get back to us. What an adventure!

The farther west we get, the scenery continues to improve, and the rain seems to fade away. The temps were super chilly in the mornings and by afternoon we are removing layers and enjoying the weather even more. I never thought I would say that riding an interstate was pretty, but I-90 is beautiful! We had thought about going north to highway 2 at one point, but the time constraints kept us on interstates.

By now we have the roommates figured out, three who like the room cold and can sleep through about anything, and three that like the room warmer and quieter. I would suggest that you spend some over nights with traveling partners a head of time to get this all figured out. We rotated sleeping partners so that every third night you get the bed to yourself, in hopes you would sleep better at least every third day.

Our original plan was to leave at 7am and ride until 4pm. We would make the gas stops 20 min or less and book the hotel for that evening at lunch time. We had a gas limit of every 120 miles, which worked out great as every 2 hours you stop and at least get off the bike, stretch, and share a couple red bulls. Our Favorites are: Karen – Peach nectarine, Kathy and Vicki – limeade and crisp pear, and Karrie- anything that didn't have coconut. None for Cookie or Bobbi. Vicki started with just a sip and was up to ½ a can by California.

Just to total things up at this point, we have 2- Harleys, 2- Hondas, and pretty much 2-indians. Everyone has had some sort of issue or drop by the time we got to the west coast. One bike just kept taking the beating and kept on going! Karen and that, curb jumping, Harley ended up having a huge truck back into her and crunch the fender. Then it picked up a nail in the parking lot on our way to the convention hotel! Bobbi dropped hers at a toll booth, lost her back breaks going across the golden gate bridge, and kept losing the screws that keep the windshield on. Why do they make those so short?

Vicki was getting used to the new shorty windshield and riding the curves like a boss! She dropped hers at the Wisconsin Dells, and she tucked and rolled like a professional stunt artist.

Karrie our fearless leader dropped hers in New York state in a drainage swell at the hotel parking lot. After an especially long day, this is what prompted the extra day in Erie.

Kathy's bike decided that after swimming our way out of the keys it was too wet to continue.

Victory put the battery behind the front wheel very low to the ground. I guess they didn't think we ride in the rain?

Cookie's bike got shut off by hail, as if to say, "nope you are not supposed to ride in hail".

We laughed until we all had tear stained faces. Next, we rode into Victorville during an earthquake. We honestly thought the road was just rough. Come to find out we rode during a 6.9 earthquake. Vicki and Karen were very sleepy, yet we had another 50 miles to get to our destination. Kathy decided to wake everyone up by waving "hello" to the cows, poles, tumbleweed, and oncoming cars. Well of course, the cows and poles didn't wave back, but those oncoming cars... a couple started to wave. I yelled "hey how you doin?", they couldn't hear me, but Vicki and Karen could. Karrie, Cookie, and Bobbi just thought I had a wasp inside my jacket. Karrie quit coming up beside me when we stopped, and when she finally did she waved back at Kathy! She was so excited! A couple of young people threw their phones down when they waved, which caused a ripple effect of giggles from our group. The big earthquake hit shortly after we got settled down that first night! Cookie was sitting in the office chair with her feet propped up on the bed. Bobbi thought cookie was shaking the bed with her foot. They laughed and then heard the rattle of every door on that floor!! Exit route: the stairwells were locked by electronic keys... crap going down on the elevators might be a bad idea? Meanwhile, Kathy and Karen were on the patio looking at the stars enjoying no humidity! All the sudden the water starts swishing out of the pool, it was an in-ground pool! The plate glass windows flexed! Kathy yelled at Karen "Let's get away from this building! Earthquake" by now we have heard about the earlier one! Karen is like it isn't a big deal, "we are ok", then the staff running out of the building changed her mind! We went to check the bikes and find the rest of the group. All six present and accounted for! Whew, well when will the blizzard hit? We have had everything else.



## Process to Cross the Border Friday Morning Start

Hello Everyone,

Below is important information to ease your border crossing into the USA from SLRC.

#### **Summary:**

### Motorcycles (without SENTRI/Ready Lane) Line up in Lane #2

You should line up abreast of another motorcycle if you can to condense the line length.

Motorcycles must approach the booth one at a time.

Once you reach the barrier at Calle 2, you may cross over to Lane #3 (for Booth #7) if there is clearance for car traffic behind you to enter SENTRI Booth #8

Otherwise stay in the lane for Booth #6

Motorcycles with SENTRI should use Lane #3, do not wait in line

Motorcycles with **Ready Lane** should use Lane #1, lane split to head of line

### How many lanes are on Ave Calles? (Full name Ave Capitan Carlos G. Calles)

Ave Capitan Calles, the road that will take you to the crossing, has four lanes. It runs parallel to the border. Lanes are numbered north to south as you approach Ave Calles and right to left as you ride on Ave Calles.

- Lane 1 Closest to the border
- Lane 2 2<sup>nd</sup> lane from the border. It is separated from lane 3 by a yellow curb.
- Lane 3 3<sup>rd</sup> lane from the border. A yellow curb, beginning at Calle 15 separates it from Lane 2.
- Lane 4 4th lane from the border. This is for thru traffic and not for re-entry to USA

### What are Lanes 1, 2, and 3 used for? (Booths are numbered right to left)

- Lane 1 Ready Lane: If you have a Ready Lane card, use this lane #1 for your border crossing. You may lane split to head of any open line.
- Lane 2 Regular Traffic: This is for Booth #6 for traffic without Ready Lane.


  This will be the **primary lane** for 3FC riders to line up for entry.
- Lane 3 SENTRI: This lane will feed into two booths #7 and #8.

Booth #8 is farthest on the left. This lane is for **SENTRI ONLY** vehicles. If you have SENTRI on your motorcycle you can use this lane and pass other motorcycles in line for Booth #7.

Booth #7 will be for Motorcycles only.....dedicated to 3FC. See instructions in the summary for entry to this booth


